BRISBANE TELLS OF USE OF BREWERS' GOLD

torials in which he said that "England has not always been renowned for her unselfishness."

"Now, isn't that reference to the principal ally of the United States calculated to reflect on the United States?" the senator asked.

"No, I do not think so," the witness replied. "I thought then, and I think now, that England has not always been renowned for her unselfishness. That is not a reflection on the United States."

Brisbane said that A. Mitchell Palmer, whose charge had been the purchase of the Times led to the present inquiry, offered to sell him the New York Evening Mail, after that property came into Palmer's hands as alien property custodian. The price fixed was \$750,000, the witness said, but he declined to purchase it because it was losing money.

The only other newspaper he owns, Mr. Brisbane said, is the Wisconsin News. He said he purchased the Wisconsin Free Press and News and consolidated them and that brewers were not involved in that transaction.

The witness told the committee that his attitude toward the use of beer and light wines brought him in touch with brewers. He said he asked Mr. Munsey to sell him the Times and let him pay for it out of its earnings, but the request was refused.

He then went to Feigenspan. "I said to him," declared the witness, "You know my attitude on beer. You know how I feel toward your business."

Brisbane then laid before Feigenspan the plan for a loan to purchase the Times, and the brewer said he believed it would be a good investment. The witness went on to say that Feigenspan said he did not know that he could advance the full amount himself, but that he would raise the money among his friends.

Feigenspan, according to Brisbane, refused to take a mortgage on the Brisbane real estate, saying he did not wish to make a record of the loan as it might appear that he was purchasing newspaper support.

"Do you require that as a loan or do you regard it as a gift?" asked Senator Wolcott of Delaware.

"As a loan absolutely," the witness replied.

A loan by Mr. Brisbane to Victor Berger of Milwaukee, the Socialist who was elected to congress at the last election and who is under indictment for violation of the espionage law, was described by the witness.

He said labor unions in Milwaukee erected a building which they called the Brisbane building, and that he loaned Berger \$8000 for the project.

Brisbane told the committee that in 1917 when the British government closed the trans-Atlantic cables to the Hearst newspapers and news agency, he communicated with Lord Northcliffe and the latter "adjusted" the matter.

Under his contract with Hearst, the witness said, he writes what he pleases and Hearst publishes it if he wants to or declines to publish it if he desires.

"Mr. Hearst controls no one's political views; at least not mine," he said.

The committee today completed the examination of Alexander Konta, of New York, who had dealings with Dr. Dernberg, the German propagandist, relative to the purchase of a New York newspaper by the German government. Tomorrow it plans to hear A. Bruce Bielaski, chief of the department of justice investigation, who has inquired into the propaganda work of various German organizations and publications.

Big Project Near Eugene Soon to Be in Full Swing

The Benham Falls Irrigation company of San Francisco has completed its filing at the office of State Engineer Percy A. Capper on rights to water from McKenzie river for irrigation and drainage of 2,340 acres of land east of Eugene. The filing was accompanied by a fee of more than \$800. The estimated cost of the project is \$1,235,000.

AUTO OWNERS SHOULD HURRY

Policemen Will Get 'Em If They Don't Watch Out, Says Mr. Olcott

Warning to automobile owners of the state to make haste in procuring their 1919 licenses if they wish to avoid trouble with police officers was issued by Secretary of State Olcott yesterday.

"Unless the owners of automobiles who have not yet applied for their 1919 licenses, file their applications promptly they are likely to experience some possible inconvenience from the police officers about the first of January next," said Mr. Olcott. "Of the 63,317 cars licensed during the current year, applications for 1919 licenses for only 4,000 had thus been received. If our office promptly receives applications from all those motor vehicle owners who desire to operate their cars without interruption from year to year, it can get the licenses out with out delay. But if the great majority of car owners defer applying for 1919 licenses until the latter part of this month or the first of January next, it will be a physical impossibility, however well organized we may be for the work, to perform all the required labor incident to the registering of automobiles and signing and forwarding of licenses on the day of the receipt of application, as we have been able to do in the past, with but few exceptions."

"I wish to impress upon those car owners who have not yet applied for 1919 licenses, to do so at once. Our records show that by the end of December of each year, approximately 50 per cent of the car owners apply for license for the ensuing year, so there are at least 25,000 more licenses which we will be called upon to issue by January 1, or an average of 1250 for each work day of the balance of the month. Last year as many as 2500 applications were received in a single day and it was only by a supreme effort of the office force and by working overtime that we were able to check all applications and assign and mail licenses without delay."

"As the presidential party approaches Europe, by arrangements of the navy department, special receiving stations in both England and in France will listen for messages from the Pennsylvania and one of the French high power stations will forward messages direct to the ship. The president will thus be kept in touch with Washington and Paris or London simultaneously, for the George Washington will receive and fly the messages sent from the Annapolis station until the end of the voyage and the ship is in a French port."

While en route to Europe President Wilson and his party will be kept daily informed of the events of the world through the navy news report which is flashed nightly from the naval radio station at Arlington and relayed to all naval ships and stations, both at home and abroad. This report is prepared by a naval officer especially assigned for the work and is made up from Associated Press dispatches.

This service, it is understood, is being supplemented while the George Washington is crossing by additional matter prepared in the state department and referring particularly to affairs of international importance.

City of Albany Intervenes In Telephone Rate Case

Alleging that increased rates petitioned for by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company and by the Home Telephone & Telegraph company are excessive and unnecessary, the city of Albany has filed answers to the applications of both companies. Both hearings have been set for the commission for Friday, December 13, in Portland.

End of War Inspiration For Masses at St. Joseph's

In grateful acknowledgment of the cessation of war there will be a forty hours' adoration in the Catholic church, commencing with a high mass on Friday morning at 6:45, and another mass at 8. There will be continued adoration during Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Masses on Saturday will be again at 6:45 and 8, and on Sunday at 7:30 and 10:30. A sermon will be preached at the masses on Friday and Saturday by the Rev. Father Naughton, and an evening sermon Friday before benediction at 7:30 by Rev. Father Buck. Confessions will be heard on Thursday from 4 to 6 and from 7 to 8. Friday at convenient times after the masses. Saturday there will be an assistant priest from Mount Angel who will hear confessions in German from 3:30 to 6 and from 7 to 8 p. m. On Friday night there will be benediction at 8 o'clock. The ceremony will close on Sunday evening with procession in the church and benediction, after an appropriate sermon. The public is invited to any or all of these devotions.

BOARD SETS SECOND DAY FOR ELECTION

follows:

"That on account of the adverse vote cast upon the adoption of our budget for the school year 1918-1919, and on account of the fact that the chairman of the board has called a special meeting for Thursday evening, at eight o'clock, for the purpose of considering a budget, and devise ways and means for holding an election for the adoption thereof, we, your finance committee, have carefully considered the proposed budget as submitted to the voters and rejected last Saturday, November 20, 1918. We have gone over said budget, item by item, carefully considering the same, and we find that we are unable to either eliminate or cut down any of said items, for the reason that in most instances, the money has already been actually expended, or contracts made obligating the district to the expenditure, and in a few cases where this is not true, we feel that a cut would not be justified. To illustrate our position, we will take the item for insurance.

"A great portion of this insurance has not been contracted for, but we have largely cut down the insurance upon the buildings, and hesitate to eliminate more for the reason that the risk to the district is too hazardous.

"The item of \$3250 for the Holman property has received our careful consideration and we cannot see our way clear to eliminate the same for the following reasons: First, we have contracted for the property at that price, which contract was made at this time for the reason that said property was to be thrown on the market, and the board felt that the price for which the same could be bought was much less than that for which it could be bought in the future, for had the district not purchased the same, it would undoubtedly have reached the hands of some speculators and ultimately the district would have been compelled to pay an exorbitant price therefor. The board has acted upon this matter as a whole and considered that the opportunity presenting itself should be taken advantage of, and the property purchased.

"Second: We feel that the purchase of this property is one of the best investments which the district has made for some years last past. The property is being overhauled at slight expense to the district by the

manual training department of the high school. The material which is being used would be used in that department for some other purpose were it not being used for overhauling this building, and therefore the ultimate cost of remodeling the same to the district is nothing.

When the same is remodeled, there will be four first-class rooms to be rented, which can be easily rented to teachers or other persons connected with the school system for a rental of at least \$40 a month. This would bring an income to the district of at least \$400 a year which would pay interest upon the purchase price and leave the district a net profit of better than \$200 per annum. In addition to this, when remodeled, the first floor of said building will be used as the domestic science cottage, entitling our two instructors in that department to draw one-half of their salaries from the Smith-Hughes fund. This means an income to the district of \$1100 per annum, making a total income from said building to the district of not less than \$1500 per annum. We feel that in the light of these figures, no one could question the wisdom of making the purchase and of making it for the price agreed upon at this particular time, and we therefore recommend that the item remain in the budget.

"On the other side of the budget there is not much room for latitude but upon the final checking of the school census, which was completed after the first budget was adopted, it develops that there is a shortage in the enumeration of only 325 names instead of 666 names as first appeared. This would entitle us to reduce the amount of money to be raised by taxation to \$93,298.54 and would increase the item in the budget derived from state and county school funds to \$33,629, reducing the levy to 714 mills.

"After careful, conscientious and painstaking consideration of this budget, we do not find that any other changes can be made."
