McAdoo's Recommendations

Rattle the Stock Market

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Reasons
for the early hesitation and later
heaviness of today's stock market
were provided by Director General
McAdoo's recommendation to con-
gress respecting existing railroad
conditions and the partial deadlock
created by the war board's refusal
to determine new prices of output
for steel and iron.

Despite Mr. McAdoo's unqualified
disavowal of government owner-
ship, his suggestion that federal
control of the railroads be extended
to five years came as an unpleasant
surprise to financial and banking
interests.

Rails of high and low degree fell
one to two and a half points, their
reversal soon spreading to numerous
other issues.

It was generally conceded that the
reaction might have attained wider
proportions, but for the figures is-
sued by the department of agricul-
ture which estimated the value of
the country's "liberty crops" at
some \$600,000,000 in excess of any
previous record.

Steels and the general run of
equipments, also coppers, in which
the early relinquishment of govern-
ment restrictions is foreshadowed,
reacted one to two points.
