Private Bankers Start to Make Some Heavy Buying. NEW YORK, Dec. 20.--Stocks recovered the fifth successive set back of the week, the decline being resumed after an irregular opening in which few leaders showed temporary strength, probably on short covering. The additional liquidation and hearing aggression were attributed to increasing signs of dissatisfaction more particularly as affecting the railroads and general industries. Another reason was provided by the implied request of the treasury department for an indefinite continuance of restrictive monetary conditions, although call funds were freer. The supply was as low as 3 1/2 per cent. Renewal of heavy selling of liberty bonds on a scale approximately yesterday's enormous turnover with the fourth 4 1/2% at the new low quotation of \$94.50, was not calculated to allay apprehensions, the first 4 1/2% incidentally making a new minimum for the year at \$92.90. The open encouraging note was sounded by the sale to a banking syndicate of \$50,000,000 Pennsylvania railroad five per cent bonds and the speedy absorption of that issue at a large over subscription. This is the first large financial undertaking by private bankers since the close of the war and bespeaks a sound investment situation. Rails, shippings, utilities and coppers were the chief elements of heaviness, though rallying quite substantially toward the close. Sales amounted to \$15,000 shares. Convertible railroad bonds and tractionals eased 1 to 2 points but international were steady and more active. Total sales aggregated \$20,400,000 old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Rains Strengthen Corn, And Oats Are in Sympathy. CHICAGO, Dec. 20.--Strength in the corn market revived today largely from widespread rains which threatened further serious hindrance to the crop movement. Prices, although unsettled at the finish, were 1 1/2 to 5 1/2 net higher, with January 139 1/8 to 139 3/4 and May 136 1/2 to 136 7/8. Oats closed 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 up and 80 cents at an advance of 40 to 80 points. Oats sympathized with the strength of corn. Shippings demand, however, was slow, and export bids were under a working basis. Provisions were lifted chiefly by the bulge in grain. It was said that on the advance packers bought ribs.

The Grenadier guards, with their regimental colors and bands, were drawn up at the station to act as an escort to the field marshal and amid loud cheering as the band played "See the Conquering Heroes Come," the crowd of equestrians escorted Sir Douglas to a royal carriage in waiting to take the field marshal to the palace. As the carriage emerged from the station yard the bells of St. Martin's rang out and the crowds again broke into tumultuous cheering. Throngs has taken possession of Trafalgar Square long before the royal carriages bearing the field marshal and generals came into view. All the generals evinced delight at the cordiality of the reception. As the carriages passed along Cockspur street, Pall Mall, the enthusiasm was unbounded. At Marlborough House there was a brief halt, at which Sir Douglas saluted Dowager Queen Alexandra, who was standing outside her residence. Likewise at Hyde Park, down Constitution Hill and onward to Buckingham Palace there were stirring scenes. Many soldiers and sailors on leave participated in the demonstration. The carriages passed along the front of the palace to the entrance at the southern gates, where they drove up to the grand entrance. Here Field Marshal Haig and the generals passed into the palace and were received by King George and Queen Mary. After the reception they were entertained at luncheon in the state room. It was notable that the luncheon was an entirely informal function. The guests numbered about 50. The crowds which remained outside until Sir Douglas and his aides left the palace frequently sang the national anthem. "The commander-in-chief is to spend Christmas at his home at Kingston Hill. It is said that one of the first acts of the new parliament will be to have submitted to it a vote of thanks from the entire empire to Sir Douglas Haig and his generals and the troops serving under them. It is understood that the vote of thanks will be followed by the usual monetary vote.

As the carriage emerged from the station yard the bells of St. Martin's rang out and the crowds again broke into tumultuous cheering. Throngs has taken possession of Trafalgar Square long before the royal carriages bearing the field marshal and generals came into view. All the generals evinced delight at the cordiality of the reception. As the carriages passed along Cockspur street, Pall Mall, the enthusiasm was unbounded. At Marlborough House there was a brief halt, at which Sir Douglas saluted Dowager Queen Alexandra, who was standing outside her residence. Likewise at Hyde Park, down Constitution Hill and onward to Buckingham Palace there were stirring scenes. Many soldiers and sailors on leave participated in the demonstration. The carriages passed along the front of the palace to the entrance at the southern gates, where they drove up to the grand entrance. Here Field Marshal Haig and the generals passed into the palace and were received by King George and Queen Mary. After the reception they were entertained at luncheon in the state room. It was notable that the luncheon was an entirely informal function. The guests numbered about 50. The crowds which remained outside until Sir Douglas and his aides left the palace frequently sang the national anthem. "The commander-in-chief is to spend Christmas at his home at Kingston Hill. It is said that one of the first acts of the new parliament will be to have submitted to it a vote of thanks from the entire empire to Sir Douglas Haig and his generals and the troops serving under them. It is understood that the vote of thanks will be followed by the usual monetary vote.
