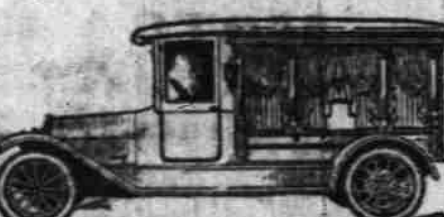

TEETH AND TONSILS

Dr. E. C. Rosenow, M. D., Mayo Foundation, Rochester, Minn., says: "Infections of the mouth and teeth in a given case should, as a rule, be rectified first. Tonsillectomy (removal of tonsils) as now so commonly practiced before the condition of the teeth has been corrected, is illogical. The lymphatics of the mouth and jaws drain into the tonsils. Some infection in the tonsils, if mechanical conditions permit, improve or even disappear following the extraction of infected teeth."—Journal Nat. Dental Assn., Feb. 1918.

A sore, swollen tonsil is very often an indication of dental trouble; and the proper course, in such a case, is to correct the dental trouble; not to destroy the tonsil that is striving to keep the dental infection out of the system.

December shows a balance in the accident fund on December 31 of \$1,326,374.10 and in the segregated fund a balance of \$1,564,278.35. Receipts for December totalled \$58,395.24 in the accident fund and disbursements \$168,639.43.

A total of 1,938 accidents was reported for the month of which 15 were fatal. During the whole period of operation of the commission 58,694 accidents have been reported of which 498 were fatal.

For the week ending January 2 a total of 377 accidents were reported to the commission, and of this number five were fatal. The fatalities were:

Of the total number of cases reported for the week 339 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act.

Investigation Money Is In Escrow in Vale Bank

State Engineer Percy A. Capper has been notified that the Warm Springs irrigation district has deposited in escrow at the United States National bank of Vale, Malheur county, \$19,449.22, representing the amount expended by the state and the federal government in investigating the project.

"On account of an adjustment of the area to be reclaimed," said Engineer Capper, "the district has requested that the amount originally expended by the reclamation service be reduced from \$14,725.61 to \$11,835.71, and that the amount expended by the state be reduced from \$4,724.61 to \$3817.71."

"The project investigated by the state and the reclamation service covered a total area of 29,150 acres. Under the system being constructed it is proposed to irrigate 31,600 acres thus leaving 7550 acres to be irrigated at a later date."

Origin of Police Matron Position Here Is Given

Objection has been made to the story current in the city that the police matron's position was an outgrowth of the discharge of a dog catcher during the administration of Dr. B. L. Steeves as mayor. The facts given by those who are acquainted with the history of the office are that one of the railroad companies had asked that a traveler's aid representative be brought here through the Y. W. C. A. This was desirable to many but the council did not lend the proposition its support. A compromise was effected and a police matron instead was appointed to serve.

Apollo Club Concert Is Postponed to Future Date

The Apollo Club concert which was scheduled to be given on the night of January 10 has been postponed indefinitely because of the epidemic of influenza, and also the reservation of seats which was to begin Monday, January 6, has been postponed.

About 700 invitations are out for the concert, these having been sent out through the nearly 150 associate members of the organization to which figure the membership has grown.

Body of Mrs. Van Winkle Will Arrive Here Monday

Attorney General Brown yesterday received a telegram from Assistant Attorney General J. H. Van Winkle saying he will arrive in Salem Monday night from Colorado Springs, Colo., with the body of Mrs. Van Winkle who died at that place several weeks ago. At the time of his wife's death Mr. Van Winkle was in a hospital with an infected hand and his recovery has been slow, making it necessary for him to remain in the hospital.

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 4.—(Special to The Statesman)—The continued cold weather of the past few days has frozen over the lakes in the fields in this vicinity and is affording the first opportunity to the young people to enjoy ice skating. The lakes between this city and Rickreall were frozen over so solid Thursday that duck hunters who have been securing large bags of ducks and geese the past two weeks returned without having fired a shot, the birds having evidently left the vicinity of the lakes for a milder climate.

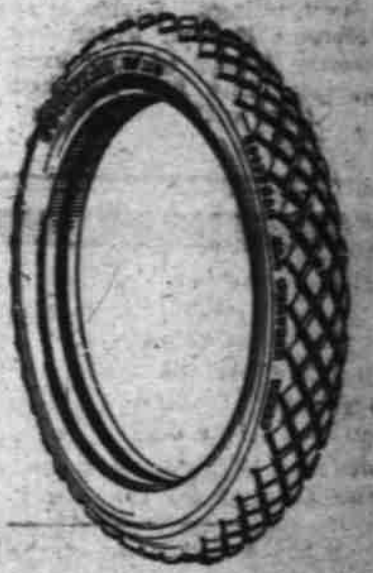
