Corn Touches the High
Market for the Season

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Renewed attention to calls from Europe for immediate supplies lifted the corn market today to the highest prices yet this season, but much of the gains were afterward wiped out. The close was unsettled at 5 1/2 to 5-8 not advanced with January, 14 1/2c; May 12 3/4 to 12 3/8-8. Oats lost 1/4 up and provisions varying from 5 decline to a rise of 25 cents.

Oats reflected the strength of corn. Resides receipts were small. Provisions went up in sympathy with grain and hogs but the advance led to free selling by packers and to weakness of January lard and ribs.

Affiliated Interests in
Control of Market

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Pools and affiliated interests were in undisputed control of today's stock market, public or outside support failing to lowebb. Representative shares were heavy, when nearly altogether neglected, speculative interest comprising a large percentage of the moderate turnover.

The market's superficial character may be judged from the fact that oils, distillers, tobaccos, food fertilizer issues represented the bulk or long account, while rails, shipwrecks and the more popular industrial and equipments registered losses of one to three points. In substance stocks most favored were those which have been little affected at all, by the transition from war to a peace basis, but gains were largely forfeited in the selling of the last hour. United States steel was under pressure, losing two points. Coppers and shipwrecks also yielded as a result of speculations.

Marine preferred was those stocks. The outbreak on cables indicating another lurch in the transfer of its British tonnage to the United States government and set back in metals coincided with reports of further cutting of prices. Sales amounted to \$35,000 shares.

Liberty and international bonds were steady, but other issues were inclined to ease, a noteworthy feature being the break of 5 1/2 points in Denver and Rio Grande refunding 5 1/2. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$8,875,000. Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

PARIS SHOCKED
(Continued from Page 1)

J. J. Jusserand, the French ambassador to the United States said: "The unexpected death of one who had upheld all his life the principles of virtue manhood, straightforward honesty and fearlessness, will be mourned all over the world, nowhere more sincerely than in France, whose cause he upheld in his worst crisis in a way that shall never be forgotten."

Herbert C. Hoover said: "The news of Mr. Roosevelt's death comes to me as a distinct shock. America is poorer for the loss of a great citizen, the world for the loss of a great man. His virility and Americanism has been one of our national treasures."

Colonel E. M. House said: "I am greatly shocked to hear the news that comes from America. The entire world will share the grief which will be felt in the United States over the death of Theodore Roosevelt. He was one virile and courageous leader of his generation and will live in history as one of our greatest presidents."

Colonel House sent to Mrs. Roosevelt a cablegram saying: "Mrs. House shares with me the great sorrow which all Americans feel over the death of your distinguished husband."

Secretary Lansing said: "The death of Colonel Roosevelt removes from our national life a great American. His vigor of mind and ceaseless energy made him a conspicuous figure in public affairs. Friends and enemies alike recognized the force of his personality and the great influence he had in molding public thought and purpose. His patriotism and devotion to his country will long be remembered by all citizens while his virile Americanism will be an inspiration to future generations."

President Poincaré, when informed by the Associated Press of the death of Colonel Roosevelt, said: "I am very much affected by the report of President Roosevelt's death. It was so unexpected. After the president had left the hospital some days ago we thought that all danger had passed. 'Well do I remember the dignified letter which I received from Mr. Roosevelt after the return of his son Quentin in which he informed me that he was coming to France to visit the grave of his son. It is a pressing to me to think that poor Roosevelt will not have an opportunity to lay flowers on the grave of his heroic son. The whole heart of France goes out to Mrs. Roosevelt in sympathy. 'Friend of Liberty, Friend of France, Roosevelt has given without counting, sons and daughters and his energy that liberty may live. We are grateful to him. We wish to express to Mrs. Roosevelt our most sincere condolence.'"

BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 6.—Carlisle Robinson said tonight: "It was a terrible shock to me to learn of the death of former President Roosevelt. I had been intimately acquainted with him from the time he was elevated to the high office of president and we were very dear and good friends. It is a terrible loss to me and to the whole country."
