DALLAS, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special).—Word has been received from Walter L. Tooze, Jr., commander of the training camp at Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, stating that, although soldiers under him had been discharged, he was still being held at that institution of learning and that in all probability he would not be able to get away from there before the latter part of May or the first of June. Mr. Tooze stated that he expects to return to Dallas after he is released from service and take up the practice of law, which he gave up when he enlisted at the outbreak of hostilities.

GERMANY FAILS AS ARMISTICE IS NOT FULFILLED

In Many Respects Terms Imposed by Marshal Foch Not Abided By

ACTION MAY RESULT

Believed Harsh Means May Be Used by Allies to Force Hun Hand

PARIS, Jan. 7.—(Havas).—Only 10 days remain before the expiration of the time allowed to Germany for the meeting of the armistice terms of Marshal Foch and many of the details remain not entirely complied with. This is particularly true as concerns article four regarding the surrender of war materials especially guns and airplanes.

About 5000 motor trucks have been delivered up, but the number of railroad engines turned over only equals half the number stipulated in the armistice—5000. A great number of the 150,000 railway cars in good working order called for are still undelivered. In addition, naval units, including submarines, remain in German ports, although under should have been surrendered. Further Germany has failed to abide by her agreement to repatriate a great number of entente soldiers held as prisoners, and in high quarters the question has arisen in spite of Marshal Foch's indulgence, the inter-allied command will not be more severe in its dealings with Germany when the expected request by Germany for a further delay in meeting the allied terms comes up.

"He Died After Victory; Let Us Salute Memory," Says Famous Frenchman

PARIS, Jan. 7.—Rene Viviani, former premier, said today concerning the death of former President Roosevelt:

"I learn with grief of the death of Roosevelt. He was a friend of France. I can remember him during our mission of 1917 to America. I can see him in New York, impetuous, ardent and energetic, his clear eyes lit up by justice, and I can hear again his first words to me: 'I and my four sons are in the service for righteousness.' He died after victory. Let us be united in saluting his great memory."

HUGHES-TAFT TO BE MOURNERS AT SIDE OF GRAVE

Prominent Men of the Nation Will Assemble in Little Town for Funeral

GOVERNOR WILL ATTEND

Leaders of Both Houses of New York Legislature Also at Funeral

OYSTER BAY, Jan. 7.—Governor Alfred E. Smith, and leaders of both houses of the legislature will represent New York state at the funeral of Colonel Roosevelt today. A few Roosevelt's closest friends have been invited to the funeral. They include Senator Henry Cabot Lodge and Charles Evans Hughes. Another mourner will be W. H. Taft whose friendship for Mr. Roosevelt had been reestablished more than a year ago. Senator Lodge and Mr. Hughes are expected to arrive early tomorrow and will spend most of the morning with the family at Sagamore hill.

The former president's body was placed tonight for the first time in the plain oak casket in which it will be taken tomorrow to Christ church where the services are to be held at 12:45 o'clock. On this casket appears only a brief inscription—the name Theodore Roosevelt and the dates of his birth and death.

(Whether those at the church will be allowed to pass before the open casket and look for the last time upon the face of the former president was not known here tonight.)

Mrs. Roosevelt was said to be undecided whether the coffin should be finally sealed before being carried into the sanctuary. Only the immediate family of Colonel Roosevelt will be present at the prayer service which will be conducted by Rev. George E. Talmage who is to officiate at the church of which he is rector.

Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and Captain Kermit Roosevelt who are with the American expeditionary forces in France, will be together while their father is being buried.

BIG SUM NEEDED TO AID NATIONS

Expected 1,400,000 Tons of Foodstuffs Imperative for Starving

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—At least 1,400,000 tons of food stuffs costing approximately \$250,000,000 delivered will be needed to carry through until next harvest the populations of the districts thus far investigated by the American staff of the commission for European relief. This estimate was sent by Herbert C. Hoover today to the food administration in a cablegram reviewing the conditions as found in central Europe and the Balkan states, Finland, Serbia, Jugo-Slavia, Vienna, Tyrol, Poland, Rumania, Bulgaria, Armenia and Czechoslovakia.

The surveys made by the American commission, Mr. Hoover said, disclosed that meats, fats, and milk are so short that in many regions the health of the people is very much impaired, mortality among women is appalling and there is constant menace through the threatened spread of Bolshevism, especially in the cities.

Besides the callers at Sagamore Hill today, long distance telephone messages came from Vice-President Marshall in Washington and Governor Alfred E. Smith in Albany. Each talked with Captain Roosevelt, extending personal sympathy, and said he would attend the funeral tomorrow.

TO OPPOSE RELIEF BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Republican opposition to the \$100,000,000 appropriation requested by President Wilson for European relief was manifested in both branches of congress. In the house, Moore of Pennsylvania blocked consideration of a bill carrying the appropriation by refusing unanimous consent to take up either today or Thursday. Senator Borah and Smoot announced in the senate that they would oppose the measure unless more information regarding plans for the use of the money was forthcoming.

tives comprise the congressional funeral party, which left here today in three special cars, accompanied by senate and house sergeants at arms and other officers. The senate delegation with Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the Republican leaders, chairman included Senator Calder of New York, Johnson of California, Knox of Pennsylvania, Kellogg of Minnesota, Poindexter of Washington, Curtis of Kansas, Harding of Ohio, Chamberlain of Oregon, Smoot of Utah, Phelan of California, Henderson of Nevada, Gay of Louisiana, King of Utah, Martin of Kentucky, New of Indiana, and Sutherland of West Virginia. Other senators left on later trains. The senate committee was enlarged, under revised plans made today, because some senators originally appointed on the committee, were unable to leave, including majority leader, Martin, while others were absent from Washington. Members of the house committee included Speaker Clark and Representatives Sherley, of Kentucky; Webb of North Carolina; Flood of Virginia; Dent of Indiana; Sherwood of Ohio; Padgett of Tennessee; Stedman, of North Carolina; Estepal, of Louisiana; Riordan, of New York; McDrew, of Illinois; Gallivan, of Massachusetts; Smith, of New York; Mann, of Illinois; Fordney, of Michigan; Gillette, of Massachusetts; Holstead, of Minnesota; Copper, of Wisconsin; Kahn, of California; Butler, of Pennsylvania; Mott, of New York; Hicks of New York; Chandler, of New York; Canbun, of Illinois; Rodenberg, of Illinois; and Bowers of West Virginia. WEST PARK, Jan. 7.—John Burroughs, foremost American naturalist, and lifelong friend of Colonel Roosevelt in a tribute to his memory today declared:

"He was a born naturalist who knew the animal life of the globe as few men do."

Mr. Burroughs said the colonel and he had made frequent trips together in the woods and fields and told how, once, at Pine Knot, Va., the colonel identified more than 80 species of birds and fowl including two new birds, Berwick's Wren and a rare warbler, unknown even to his older comrades.

Mr. Roosevelt was death to "nature fighters" as he called those writers who falsified nature. "It was almost impossible to deceive him on subjects of natural history."

ed not so they could play in the streets, but that they might pause in reverence in memory of their friend and neighbor, whose figure had once been so familiar to them.

Captain Archibald Roosevelt received a cablegram today from Lieutenant-Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., saying that he and his brother, Lieutenant Kermit Roosevelt, both with the American Expeditionary force in Europe, were together. Captain Archibald sent a cablegram in reply.

Theodore said also in his message that Dr. Richard Derby, husband of Ethel Roosevelt, was sailing at once for America. Lieutenant-Colonel Derby is in the medical corps, having sailed for France early in the war. Mrs. Derby is at Sagamore Hill. Many persons of prominence called at Sagamore Hill today.

Representing Cuba, came Carlos Manuel Cepedea, minister to the United States; Alfonso Forcade, secretary of the Cuban house of representatives and Cayetano De Quena, vice-consul. After telling Captain Roosevelt how high was the esteem in which the Cuban people held his father, they informed him that at the request of the people of Cuba the government proposed to erect in Havana a monument to the colonel's honor. Another Sagamore Hill caller was Colonel Alexander Sanbert, medical corps, United States who had at various time attended the colonel. After talking with Mrs. Roosevelt he said she was bearing up remarkably well, adding that the American people had little learned on Mrs. Roosevelt throughout his career.

Captain Roosevelt replied today to the cablegram in which President Wilson expressed to Mrs. Roosevelt his sympathy for her loss. The message was dispatched in New York by Elton Hooker, who was treasurer of the old progressive national committee and who was a Sagamore Hill visitor today. In his response to the president, Captain Archibald said: "President Woodrow Wilson, American peace mission, Paris, France."

Declared Spartacus Group Will Meet With Some Heavy Handling

TROOPS WILL ACT

Groups in Street Must Disperse and Soldiers Defend Government

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—(Havas).—The government has decided that it will end the plottings of the Spartacus Socialists with the means at present at its disposal and in a proclamation issued today instructs its troops to defend the government, and prohibits gatherings of groups in the streets. Street battles continue. During the fighting revolvers and hand grenades have been used. The number of persons killed or wounded is not known.

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San Francisco Will Cease Business As Tribute to Colonel

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—A proclamation was issued by Mayor James Rolph, Jr., today asking that all business be halted and suspending street traffic five minutes at 9:45 a. m. tomorrow out of respect for former President Theodore Roosevelt.

A memorial service will be held in the civic auditorium in the afternoon.

ROOSEVELT TO BE BURIED AS A PLAIN CITIZEN

Own Wishes Will Be Carried Out in Observing the Last Sad Rites

OWN GRAVE SELECTED

Little Plot in Village Cemetery Near Sagamore Hill Marked Out

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Jan. 7.—Theodore Roosevelt will be buried here tomorrow as a plain American citizen and not as a former president of the United States in accordance with his own wishes. His body will be laid at rest in a plot of his own selection in the village cemetery not far from the Sagamore hill which he loved so well.

The only funeral rites will be the simple Protestant Episcopal service. It will be read by the rector of the little country church where he had worshipped with his family. There will be none of the pomp and circumstances associated with the passing of great men but the presence of Vice President Marshall, who will represent President Wilson, General Peyton C. March, representative of the army and Admiral Winslow, the navy, will add to the ceremony the dignity of the nation.
