CASES OF 'FLU' ARE INCREASING

Forty-two New Cases Yesterday; Board of Health to Meet Today

To make arrangements to cope with the influenza situation the city council, constituting the board of health, will hold a meeting probably at noon today.

Although the total number of houses quarantined remains stationary at about 170, the number of cases turned in by the doctors yesterday jumped from the average 35 per day to 42. City Health Officer J. Ray Pemberton declined to make a definite statement as to whether it is becoming more serious, but believes he will be able to summarize it.

Eleven patients are now in the emergency hospital being conducted by the Red Cross. A competent staff of nurses is now working under the direction of Miss Hollenbeck. Miss Purley has charge at night while Miss Proctor, Miss Telkar, Mrs. Brown and Miss Grace Taylor and giving assistance. Miss Elsie Casper is dietician.

Five volunteer nurses are aiding at homes in the city and Miss Taylor, one graduate and two aides are acting as visitors.

Portland Commissioner Still Held in Doubt

Question of whether Dan Kellaher will hold his seat as city commissioner of Portland, or whether he will be succeeded by Dr. T. L. Perkins, still an open one as announced by the supreme court yesterday would be reargued Thursday at one o'clock. An opinion had been expected today. City Attorney La Roche and Deputy City Attorney Hindman appear for city and Wilson T. Hume for Kellaher.

Reason for reargument not given but assumed either a disagreement had been reached, or courtesy being extended to newly elected justice, A. S. Bennett, allow him to hear arguments.

Only question involved will be seating of Kellaher or Perkins, all other questions have been decided in prior opinion.

Fruit Cannery May Be Operated by Assessor

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 6.—(Special)—That Dallas may have a permanent cannery within the next year is the bright prospect that faces this community with the opening of 1919. C. S. Graves, county assessor, and his brother, Roy Graves, who have been operating a plant in Tillamook county, are willing to establish such a plant here if they can obtain a suitable building and the assurance of farmers and fruit growers that they will raise enough produce to make the venture a paying proposition.

The Dallas Commercial club which has been endeavoring to secure such a concern during the past several years will probably take up the matter at a meeting in the near future and devise ways and means of securing the building and the necessary produce for the concern. A cannery is badly needed at this place as there are tons and tons of fruit and vegetables which are wasted each year on account of there being no such establishment within shipping distance.

THIRD COMPANY L MAN IS DEAD

Newman Dennis of Dallas Is Buried in France; Married French Girl

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 6.—(Special)—Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Dennis, residents of the Oakdale district, a few miles west of Dallas, received a message from Colonel John M. May, commanding the Oregon troops in France, Sunday, stating that their son, Newman Dennis, is dead. Whether the young man died of wounds or from disease was not stated in the message. Colonel May also stated that the troops were to leave for home on the 6th of January.

Dennis was one of the popular members of Company L of this city and served with the troops on the Mexican border. He was a graduate of the Dallas high school and had won the rank of sergeant. A short time ago the young soldier married a French girl and was going to make his parents here a visit and then return to France to make that country his future home. His death makes the third to occur in the ranks of Company L since the outbreak of the war.

KIECKHEFER WINS AGAIN.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Angle Kieckhefer, three cushion billiard champion, tonight defeated Pierre Maudpome, Mexican challenger, 55 to 46, in the second block of the match. In the score now stands 100 to 96 in Kieckhefer's favor. Tomorrow night's block will end the match.

LABOR TO TALK PEACE

LONDON, Jan. 7.—(British wireless service)—The labor correspondent of the Times in an article on the world labor congress which is to meet in Lausanne, Switzerland, next Monday, says that according to statements of the promoters the object of the congress primarily is to make known the opinion of the working classes of all countries on the terms of peace and a league of nations; to draw up a charter of international labor legislation and to endeavor to obtain light on the situation in Russia and to aid the Russian people. Invitations have been sent to all organizations represented at the last inter-allied labor conference, including the American Federation of Labor.
