#### Grain and Hogs Higher And Provisions Lifted

CHICAGO, Jan. 8 .- Slight advance in the corn market took place today owing to explicit denials that imports of corn from Argentina were being authorized. The market closed unsettled, ¼ to 1% net higher, with January 148 to 14814 and May 141% to 141%. Oats finished half off to a like advance and provisions varying from 30 cents decline to a rise of 7 cents.

Oats were governed by the action of corn. Higher quotations on grain and hogs lifted previsions, but setbacks resulted later owing to delay in fixing the February value of packers' droves.

#### Specialists Take Eye On New York Markets

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 .- Specialties again attracted the attention of speculative interests in today's fairly active stock market, although operations were suspended for the ses sion at 12:30 o'clock as a mark of respect to the memory of Theodore Roosevelt. Trading ran mainly to tobaccos, sugars, leathers, oils and motors stocks of the sc-called peac variety, but also embraced high grade specialties of no particular classification such as Sears Roebuck

Woolworth and Barrett company. Rails were slow to get under way but averaged gains of 1 to 1 1/2 points towards the close on a sudden inquiry for St. Pauls, Great Northern, Missouri Pacific, Norfolk and Western and Texas Pacific. A 37 point jump in Texas trust certificates was the spectacular feature of the sea-United States steel yielded a part of its one point advance and kindred industrials and equipments were sluggish and not materially higher. Coppers eased under furth-

er pressure. Shippings constituted the only conspicuous drawback, marine preferred making an extreme decline of 31/2 points on persistent reports of more serious obstacles to the completion of the company's plans for the sale of its British tonnage. Sales amounted to 300,000 shares Call money opened at 5 percent but the demand was so urgent as to cause an immediate rise to six per cent at which large sums were reported to have been taken. Bonds were steady, but featureless, foremost issues recording little alteration. Total sales (par value) aggregated \$8,250,000. Old United States bonds were unchanged.

LONDON, Jan. 8 .- Writing in the Daily News today on Field Marshal Haig's report, Major General Sir Frederick Maurice, former chief director of military operations of the war, comments upon the calmness with which the British success won in the autumn, was received at Foch, he says, need not be lessened if we follow his example in paying to Field Marshal Haig and the British armies the tribute which is their due. The British commander justly claims that the decisive effort of the whole campaign was the battle of Cambrai from September 27 to October 5, in which the British armles broke through the vast defenses of the Hindenburg system.
