Grain and Hogs Higher

And Provisions Lifted

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Slight advance in the corn market took place today owing to explicit denials that imports of corn from Argentina were being authorized. The market closed unsettled, 1/4 to 1 1/2 net higher, with January 148 to 148 1/2 and May 141 1/2 to 141 1/2. Oats finished half off to a like advance and provisions varying from 30 cents decline to a rise of 7 cents.

Oats were governed by the action of corn. Higher quotations on grain and hogs lifted provisions, but setbacks resulted later owing to delay in fixing the February value of packers' droves.

SEATTLE IS TRIMMED
SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 8.—Victoria's hockey club, trounced by Seattle in the first game, came back tonight on the metropolitan's ice and won a brilliant 1 to 0 victory over Seattle. Spectacular running by both team's forwards, together with hard checking, kept the spectators on edge throughout. Captain Eddie Oatman of Victoria, who has just recovered from a long illness, was in every play for the visitors. "Moose" Johnson, defense of Victoria, snagged the only goal, which was made in the first period. Forward the goal of the contest, however, only wizardly goal tending by Tommy Murray prevented the metropolitanians from tying the score.

General Maurice Pays

Tribute to British

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Writing in the Daily News today on Field Marshal Haig's report, Major General Sir Frederick Maurice, former chief director of military operations of the war, comments upon the calmness with which the British success won in the autumn, was received at home. Our gratitude to Marshal Foch, he says, need not be lessened if we follow his example in paying to Field Marshal Haig and the British armies the tribute which is their due. The British commander justly claims that the decisive effort of the whole campaign was the battle of Cambrai from September 27 to October 5, in which the British armies broke through the vast defenses of the Hindenburg system.

"In the three months from August 8 to November 11 the British won eight great victories, which yielded 188,700 prisoners and 1,840 guns in this final campaign the French

armies took 129,000 prisoners and 1,180 guns, and the American 42-300 prisoners and 1,421 guns. The Belgians 14,500 prisoners and 474 guns.
