Former Salem Woman Dies from Influenza in City

Friends of Mrs. Irwin Grewell (Katie Wiest) are sorrowing over her death, which came Tuesday from pneumonia following a 10-day illness of influenza.

Mrs. Grewell was a graduate of Washington high school, Portland, and later taught in Marion county schools. Her marriage came a little over a year ago. Tuesday she gave birth to a baby girl which did not live.

She is survived by her husband, Irwin Grewell, her father, E. W. Wiest, of Portland, two brothers, W. A. Wiest, of Salem, and Roy Wiest, of Portland, and one sister, who is attending Oregon Agricultural college.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon in Portland from the Dunning & McGintie parlors with interment in Rose City Park cemetery.

Capacity of Gravel Plant to Be More Than Doubled

Improvements involving an expenditure of \$10,000 are to be made at once by the Salem Sand and Gravel company, which is about to enlarge its plant at the foot of Court street. An electric unloader, additional barges and bunkers are to be installed within the next 30 days and these will more than double the capacity of the concern. The company has also negotiated a lease on Minto island and will remove large quantities of sand from that place. This will be needed to fill large road contracts on hand.

Officers of the company are Paul B. Wallace, president; Charles K. Spaulding, vice president; Roy Mills, secretary and Joseph H. Albert, treasurer.

COMMITTEE TO PERUSE BILLS

Eddy, Bell, Ritner, Moser and Shanks Will Study Reconstruction

All measures pertaining to the subject of reconstruction coming up for consideration of the state senate will be referred to a special committee, created by the adoption yesterday of Senator Eddy's resolution introduced for that purpose. Immediately upon adoption of the resolution President Vinton appointed as members of the committee Senators Eddy, Bell, Ritner, Moser, Shanks and Wheeler.

A deviation from the regular order in the senate yesterday was that of granting the privilege of the floor to E. J. Adams of Eugene, former member of the state highway commission, who is urging upon the legislature the appropriation of a sum of money sufficient to maintain two men at Washington for two years whose duty shall be to urge upon members of congress, through personal appeal, the necessity of increasing the amount of money allowed the states for construction of roads in forest reserves. At present Oregon receives from the government \$227,000 a year which the state must match on a 50 per cent basis. Mr. Adams believes this should be increased by \$1,000,000 a year over a period of 10 years and would have the Oregon representation, whom he thinks should have the backing of the state chamber of commerce, work to that end. He suggested that the money for their maintenance should be appropriated from the state highway fund. Mr. Adams produced a map showing that the state has 12,000,000 acres of untaxed lands in forest reserves, or 22 per cent of the state, which if on the tax rolls would be taxed on a basis of an estimated valuation of \$99,850,350. On this basis he argued that the government should spend more money for road construction within the reserves.

"The federal government is holding these lands as a speculation for the unborn children of the future," said Mr. Adams, "not only the children of Oregon, but the children of all other states. Why then should it not be just that the government be asked to help build the roads?" Mr. Adams urged that the legislature send delegations to the legislatures of California and Washington to secure their co-operation in similar action. The bill providing maintenance for the workers in Washington Mr. Adams suggested should be formulated by the roads and highways committee.

S. B. 10, Norblad—Taking from district attorneys one third of money collected for fisheries fines and putting same in state treasury.

S. B. 11, Eberhard—Uniform sales law.

S. B. 12, Banks—Compulsory voting law.

S. B. 13, Huston—Relating to old soldiers' taxation exemption.

S. B. 14, Huston—Providing for women attendants in all public institutions.

S. B. 15, Huston—Creating state market commission.

S. B. 16, Norblad—Providing for sale of both real and personal mortgaged property en masse on foreclosure if deemed advisable.

S. B. 17, Bell—Authorizing executor of estate to borrow money for payment of expenses of administration, taxes or other indebtedness.

S. B. 18, Eberhard—To make uniform bills relating to limited partnerships.

S. B. 19, Baldwin—Providing that state banking reserve requirements shall not apply to state banks which are members of the Federal Reserve banking system.

S. B. 20, Baldwin—Authorizing state superintendents of banks to furnish federal reserve bank copies of all reports and information pertaining to federal reserve system.

S. B. 21, LaFollett—Eliminating state aid for industrial accident commission.

HARMONY NOW HOVERS OVER CONSOLIDATION

Two Houses of Legislature Get Together and Results Are Possible

DISSENSION IS OVER

Dimick Steps Down to Keep Proposal from Going On to the High Rocks

While the first two days of the legislature indicated a split between the two houses on the consolidation question because of a difficulty to get together as to the form of handling what promises to be one of the most important problems facing that body, yesterday brought harmony and peace out of the two days' underlying dissension and bitterness. The house passed Dimick's senate joint resolution providing for a committee from the senate and three from the house to pass on the consolidation questions and it is tentatively agreed that the leader of the house committee will be the leader of the joint committee.

With the introduction of the resolution it had been understood that its passage would mean that Dimick would become chairman of the joint committee. But a hasty peace was patched up when Dimick retired from his position on that point, declaring he would sacrifice the honor for the sake of saving the consolidation program from being dashed onto the rocks.

Dimick has been through several sessions and has watched futile attempts at consolidation and two years ago was chairman of the senate committee which ineffectually attempted to put over a program, but which was blocked by the maneuvers of the house committee on the same subject. Consequently he declares it must be a question of give and take between the two houses if a satisfactory solution of the consolidation question is reached.

Members on both sides express optimism over the outlook as it now stands.

The program outlined is for all consolidation legislation to be thrown into the joint committee and there a comprehensive plan be outlined. Bills will be drawn and half of them sent to the senate and half to the house for disposal in that manner. Instead of throwing the whole batch into the one house. Members assert that the outlook is the best in the history of the legislature for something to be accomplished.

So far they generally decline to comment upon the consolidation commission's program, further than to intimate that it will not be accepted in its entirety, although portions of it will probably be given careful scrutiny to determine whether it shall be accepted or put into the discard. The general consensus of opinion is that the committee will adopt a program of its own.

Dimick Wants Soldiers and Sailors Exempted

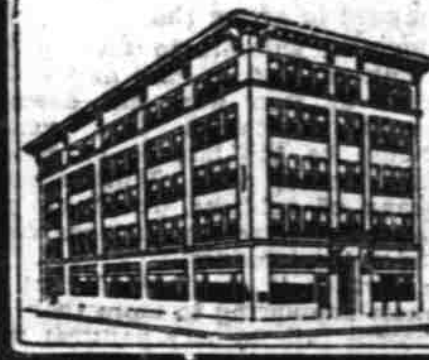

Resolutions Passed On Death of Mr. Sutherland

Resolutions of condolence on the death of John D. Sutherland, late cashier in the state treasurer's office and clerk in charge of notes and mortgages of the state land board, were adopted at a meeting of the land board yesterday. The resolutions mention the 28 years of faithful service by Mr. Sutherland in the employ of the state, and will be presented to the widow, son and daughter and recorded in the minutes of the board.

The resolutions follow: "WHEREAS, John D. Sutherland, cashier and clerk in charge of the notes and mortgages of the state land board, and in the state treasurer's office, has been called to the great beyond, and

"WHEREAS, Mr. Sutherland has rendered faithful, efficient and courteous service for a period of twenty-eight years, therefore, be it

"RESOLVED, that the state land board appreciating the valuable services rendered to the state and the board by Mr. Sutherland, deeply deplore the loss sustained in his demise, and tenders to his widow, son and daughter, its deepest sympathy in their bereavement; and be it further

"RESOLVED, that a copy of these resolutions be presented to Mrs. Sutherland and that they also be recorded in the minutes of the board."

District Attorney Fees Target of Norblad Bill

Elimination of what is termed a survival of the fee system is the object of a bill introduced yesterday by Senator Norblad providing that one third of the money collected by the district attorneys for fish fines shall be turned over to the state treasury for the state hatchery fund to be used in the propagation of salmon. The law provides that this money go to the district attorneys as compensation for prosecuting the cases. Frequently, it says, the amount runs high.

Another bill introduced by Norblad would make it possible for taxpayers of counties to tax themselves to provide means and methods to prospect for oil and other minerals.

Holiday for Schools Is to Be Urged by Senator

There is laxity in the teaching of patriotism in the Oregon schools. Senator I. L. Patterson of Polk county believes, and he will introduce a bill to change the school law and make Washington's birthday a half-holiday for schools. A requirement will be appropriate exercises in the forenoon with dismissal of school in the afternoon. Members of patriotic women's clubs in the state are said to be interested in the proposed measure.

Legislature Adjourns Today and Comes Back on Monday

There appears to be no doubt that the state legislature will adjourn this afternoon, not to recon-

vene until Monday. There was talk of adjournment yesterday, but by waiting until today, a joint resolution for adjournment will not be necessary under the law which prohibits adjournment for more than three days without joint resolution. While a large part of the members expect to return to their homes for the remainder of the week, the ways and means committees of the two houses have been split into sub-committees that will put in their time visiting the several state institutions that have not already been visited.

Would Force Reopening of Land Fraud Cases

The state land board yesterday adopted a resolution introduced by State Treasurer Hoff in which the attorney general is called upon to investigate allegations contained in a report of the Marion county grand jury of 1907, charging that school lands had been fraudulently secured from the state. The attorney general is told to investigate and if found advisable, to secure funds from the legislature for further investigations or for starting prosecutions to secure return of the lands.

Plan Presented for Aid in Saving Big Project

W. B. Roberson of Portland has put up a proposal to the desert land board to take over the Tumalo project in Deschutes county and endeavor to plug up the leak. If successful, he states, he will sell the lands and turn over to the state \$75,000 from such sale, the balance to go to himself for the work done on the project. The desert land board has taken the matter under advisement.
