SPECULATION IS TARGET OF BILL

Smith Measure Proposes County Option on Property Sold for Taxes

To put a quietus on the operations of speculators in properties sold for taxes Senator I. S. Smith yesterday introduced a bill which gives counties an option on all properties sold for taxes. The bill would allow county courts to issue certificates of delinquency, bearing the regular 12 per cent interest, to individuals for all or part or all of the property involved or to exercise its own right to the property. The present law compels counties to issue certificates of delinquency to applicants according to priority in filing applications.

Another change would be that penalties, as well as principal and interest, would be required of persons to whom certificates are sold. Legal assistance would be provided district attorneys in carrying out the provisions of the law in all counties. This is now allowable only in counties of 50,000 or more inhabitants, which limits it to Multnomah county. An important departure from the present statute is that the law is made to apply only to the latest tax roll and not to any tax roll. Right would be given to proceed against the property itself regardless of where the owner might be. Another amendment is that judgments and decrees for the payment of money under the laws of this state. Decree would set any persons from raising objections as to the amount of taxes, assessments, penalties, interest or costs due or collectable from the date of entry of the judgment and decree. Another deviation from the statute now pending would be that the sheriff be allowed to include any number of tracts in one deed and not be required to execute separate deeds for separate pieces of property.

Senator Pierce introduced a bill making easier the apprehension of bootleggers and eliminating paroles. The bill relates to the proof required in violations of the prohibition law and grows out of the experience of Oregon counties adjacent to the Idaho line.

A compromise will doubtless be effected by the committee on assessment and taxation on Senator Pierce's bill to tax incomes to create a fund for road building purposes. Senator Pierce and Senator I. S. Smith will bring in a minority report in favor of the bill as introduced providing a tax on the incomes both of corporations and individuals. Senator Rittner and Senator Wood, members of the committee, do not oppose the bill directly as it stands, but Senator Rittner believes it should be referred to the people. The committee is generally agreed that the graduated tax scale should start with incomes of \$3000 instead of \$4000 as provided in the measure. The amendment will doubtless provide that a tax be not assessed against incomes of corporations, but against the individual incomes of those interested in the corporations instead.

Senator Pierce's resolution urging the formation of a league of nations was altered by the committee on resolutions to make the Monroe doctrine recognized as a principle and in its changed form was passed by the senate. No reference was made to the Monroe doctrine in the original resolution.

Members of the Oregon delegation in congress, President Wilson and the chief clerk of the senate are to receive the resolution.

Urging the Oregon delegation in congress to make an effort to procure two captured German cannons for Oregon as souvenirs of the war is the substance of a memorial introduced by Senator Huston and adopted in the senate yesterday. It is proposed that the guns be placed in the lawn of the state capitol building. The memorial makes the claim that the achievements of Oregon soldiers in the war should justify this act by congress.

Senator Baldwin introduced a bill proposing a constitutional amendment raising from 2 to 10 per cent, the limit for which counties may bond themselves for road purposes. Compulsory compensation under the workmen's compensation act is provided in a bill introduced by Senator Smith of Coos and Curry counties, with a provision that an option as to rejecting or accepting the act may be extended to farm workers. Otherwise the bill would extend compulsory compensation to virtually all other industrial employments.

Dentistry Licenses to Cover Every Office

Any person or firm that wishes to practice dentistry in the state or opens up an office for that purpose is secure a state license and dentistry cannot be practiced under other conditions, is the provision of a bill introduced by Representative McFarland yesterday.

PORTLAND TO ANNEX LAND

Memorial Asking German Cannon for State House Lawn Is Adopted

The city of Portland will be able to annex the property of the Peninsula company under the provisions of house bill No. 4, which was passed in the senate yesterday. Other concerns will be similarly affected by the measure, if it is enacted finally into law by the governor's signature. The properties involved were not included when Portland annexed St. Johns. Under the authorization of the bill the city will have authority to bring within its jurisdiction any property that is completely surrounded by the city limits, regardless of whether the owners of the property consent to such annexation.

The bill introduced by the Multnomah county delegation giving the commissioners of Multnomah county authority to designate where the ferriesboats W. S. Mason, Lionel R. Webster and John F. Caples shall be operated on the Willamette river within the city of Portland was passed by the senate.

It is explained in the bill that when the county took over the boats from the city of Portland it was agreed that they should be operated where they are located at present, but that the trend of ferry traffic has been changed by the building of bridges, making necessary legislation as provided in the bill.

Senate bill No. 59, by Eddy, making a deadlock on any opinion in the supreme court operate automatically as an affirmation of the lower court was passed.

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Wish to Secure \$5000 for Marion Hatchery

In a bill introduced yesterday in the house by Representatives Hughes and Bean \$5000 is appropriated for a hatchery on the Santiam river and \$5000 also is appropriated for a hatchery on the upper Willamette.

BUDGET HACKED BY COMMITTEE

Hospital Request Is Again Trimmed—Secretary Olcott Wins Approval

Final action on an appropriation to be recommended for the state hospital for the insane was taken by the ways and means committee to the senate and the house Monday night and the figure set at \$867,000. Superintendent Steiner had registered a request for \$958,500, and the cut last night was to a lower figure than tentatively allowed last week.

State aided institutions were represented before the meeting by W. G. McLaren, Mrs. R. E. Bristow, A. L. Keenan, C. H. Dodd and Major Andrus of the Salvation army who urged that the per capita allowance of \$10 a month for babies and \$8 for older children be continued. The total applied for in the budget was \$115,000, the same amount allowed two years ago. Inasmuch as the institutions had turned back to the general fund \$26,000, they were last night allowed \$90,000, which with the \$26,000 added gives them a larger amount than two years ago.

Secretary of State Olcott was before the board and agreed to certain cuts relative to maintenance to capitol building and grounds and to the state department. For the former \$68,950 was asked and a cut of \$2000 made. For the state department \$59,300 was asked and \$500 cut, making the amount allowed \$58,800. For the publication of the Blue Book \$6000 was allowed, a cut of \$500.

Concerning the upkeep of the capitol building and grounds Senator Patterson said:

"I have visited various institutions and have not hesitated to offer criticism where I thought it was due. Senator Strayer and I inspected the capitol building and I want to say that I have never been in buildings that were better kept. I don't think I was ever through buildings before where I could not suggest some improvement. It is due to Mr. Olcott to say this."
