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MEASURE WOULD PROTECT STATE

**Quadrennial Bond Is Provided
for Men Sitting in
Public Office**

Better protection of the state against the possibility of embezzlement by state officers is set forth as the object of a bill introduced yesterday by Senator Eberhart. The requirements of the bill were recommended in the annual report of the Secretary of State. It provides for annual interest instead of quadrennial bonds to be given by all state officers and that the bonds of all except the secretary of state and the state treasurer be filed with the secretary of state. Under the constitution the bonds of the two latter officials are filed with the governor.

Under the present law it is explained, an official might steal money every year of his incumbency, and the state would be able to collect over the whole period only the amount of the four-year bond. Under the proposed system the state would be able to recover the amount of the bond for each year of the official's incumbency. Premiums to be paid by the state would be slightly in excess of that now paid.

Another salary bill came in yesterday. Senator Bell of Lane county introduced a bill to increase the salary of the county judge from \$1200 to \$1500, the county commissioners from \$3 a day to \$1500 a year each, the county treasurer from \$1200 to \$1500, and empowering the county school superintendent, with the approval of the county court, to employ all necessary clerical assistance, instead of one clerk or stenographer as at present, and allowing him in place of the present \$500 a year whatever amount is necessary to pay for clerical hire.

Senator Handley introduced a bill to repeal the act of 1899 which provided for the incorporation of the port of Tillamook, the improvement of Hoquartion slough, the appointment of a port warden and which established a collection of wharfage dues and tonnage.

S. B. 102, by Judiciary Committee—To amend chapter 13 of laws of 1915, excepting certain personal property from execution or attachment.

S. B. 104, by Eberhart—Requiring state and county officers to furnish annual rather than term bonds, making secretary of state custodian of the same and providing for their approval by the district attorney.

S. B. 105, by Handley—Repealing the law of 1899 establishing and incorporating the port of Tillamook.

S. B. 106, by Handley—Providing that persons who have been practicing veterinary medicine and surgery for more than 20 years shall be granted a license to practice.

S. B. 107, by Bell—Increasing the salary of the county judge, county commissioners and the county treasurer of Lane county.

S. B. 108, by Smith of Coos and Curry—Relating to the taxation of real property owned by banks.

S. B. 109, (Sub. for 33), by committee on education—Providing that Washington's birthday shall be a school holiday.

S. B. 110, by Multnomah delegation—Increasing the salaries of the circuit judges of Multnomah county from \$4000 to \$5000 a year and providing that the county shall pay the increase.

S. B. 111, by La Follett—Abolishing the office of parole officer.

S. B. 112, by Dimick—Providing that all persons, institutions, departments or officers collecting state money shall turn the same over to the state treasurer monthly.

State Banks Placed Upon Footings of National Banks

State banks that are members of the federal reserve system are placed on the same footing as national banks by one of Senator Baldwin's bills which passed the lower house Wednesday and was signed by the governor.

The first bill changes the reserve requirement for state bank members of the federal reserve system to conform to the reserve requirement under the federal reserve banks. Herebefore a reserve of 15 per cent with 3 per cent cash has been required, and under the law the requirement is 7 per cent with 3 per cent cash. The reserve must be carried with the federal reserve bank.

Another bill of Senator Baldwin signed by the governor yesterday, empowers the state superintendent of banks to give the federal reserve bank copies of reports made by the state banking department on banks that are applicants for membership in the federal reserve system or that already are members of the system.
