Senator Gill of Multnomah county has introduced a bill which provides that arrangement shall be made for the examination of the eyes, ears, nose, throat and teeth of pupils in the public schools and for the reporting of other physical defects. Examinations would be made during the first month of the school year. If necessary is apparent, recommendation shall be made that the child be examined by a competent physician or surgeon. If parents are negligent about procuring the care of physicians the cases would be reported to the county health officer.

Bills introduced in the senate yesterday were:
S. B. 112, by LaFollett—To amend section 1, chapter 116, laws of 1917, creating the position of state parole officer.
S. B. 114, by Gill—Providing for the disposition of bodies of dead animals.

S. B. 115, by Gill—Providing for examination and care of children in the public schools of Oregon.
S. B. 116, by Gill—To amend section 4057, Lord's Oregon laws, consolidating school elections with general elections, the judges and clerks of the general elections to serve for the school election.

S. B. 117, by Farrell—Creating child welfare revision commission to codify all laws pertaining to children.
S. B. 118, by Rittner and Porter—Providing for annual levy to aid Pacific International Livestock exposition.

S. B. 119, by Rittner—Giving cities and towns jurisdiction over roads and streets within corporate limits.
S. B. 120, by Norblad—To provide for non-partisan judiciary.

S. B. 121, by Handley—Giving counties right to appropriate \$5000 for memorials to returned soldiers and sailors.

S. B. 122, by Eberhard—Giving cities right to prosecute violations of prohibition laws.
S. B. 124, by Eberhard—Giving judges right to call special jury panels at any time and for any reason within his discretion.

S. B. 125, by Eberhard—Authorizing municipal judges to issue search warrants for purpose of searching for liquor.

S. B. 126, by Moser—Regulating practice of chiropractors.

S. B. 127, by Moser—Empowering municipalities to establish setback lines for purpose of regulating construction of buildings.

S. B. 128, by Huston—Requiring administrators to record certified copies of order decreeing that all claims against estate have been satisfied.

Loftgren Bill Abolishing Multnomah Court Passes

The house yesterday passed a bill doing away with the county court of Multnomah county and reposing the probate business of that court into a circuit judge, and elevating the present judge to the new circuit judgeship created. A similar bill passed two years ago but was declared unconstitutional. Representative Loftgren, introducer of the measure stated that it would in no way conflict with the domestic relations bill introduced in the senate by Huston.

Mr. Loftgren also suggested that country members might find it beneficial to remove the probate jurisdiction from county judges.

Would Assess Corporations on a Higher Valuation

Valuations of the public service commission would be used as the basis for the assessed valuation of public utility corporations under a bill introduced yesterday by Representative Richards. The rate valuations are much higher than the valuations assessed for tax making purposes.

This was an innovation contented for by Ben F. West, county assessor for Marion county when he was a candidate for state treasurer and will receive the support of a decided following in the legislature.

LaFollett Proposes to Abolish Parole Office

Senator La Follett of Marion county has introduced a bill for abolition of the office of state parole officer. The bill which would amend the present law, would make it the duty of circuit judges, when paroling persons, to make written conditions of the parole order to be forwarded to the warden of the state penitentiary instead of to the parole officer, and that person paroled report to the warden instead of the parole officer.

Effort Being Made to Reinstate the Poll Tax

The poll tax which was struck out several years ago by the legislature as being an unworkable law and costing more to collect than it is worth, would be reinstated under a bill by Representative Richards to which provision is also made that failure to pay poll tax would cause the forfeiting of the right to the use of the ballot.

Drastic Bill Aimed at Drunken Auto Drivers

After an automobile driver had once been convicted for driving his car while in an intoxicated condition and was convicted for a second offense, his car would be confiscated and sold, under a bill introduced by Representative Hurd, and furthermore he would be deprived of his license and a new one could not be issued to him.
