SOUTH AMERICA REGULATES CORN
Prices Follow Trend of Strike in Buenos Aires; Drop Taken

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Strike settlement reports from Argentina brought about lower prices today in the corn market here. The close was heavy, with May 118 1/2 and July 114 1/2 to 114 1/4. Oats finished 1/2 to 1 1/4 cents down, and provisions off 12 cents to \$100 advance.

Before the Argentine sentiment began to dominate the market, buying took place owing to announcement that the allied blockade had been lifted completely except in the case of Germany and that 6,000,000 bushels of breadstuffs a month would be allowed to go to that country hereafter. Soon, however, decided weakness set in as a result of advices that the end of the port strike at Buenos Aires was at hand. Oats sympathized with the weakness of corn. Most of the trade was local.

Excessive offerings of hogs carried down provisions, and so likewise did the lower trend of grain. Covering by shorts was only in part an offset.
