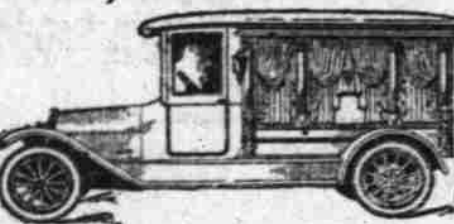

## OLEOMARGERINE TAX FAVORED

House Refuses to Kill It and May Pass It When on Third Reading

The oleomargerine bill is on the calendar for this reading, so amended as to materially reduce the tax on that class of product from that provided in the original bill, yet nevertheless leaving a sizeable tax to be imposed on the manufacturer, wholesaler, retailer, hotel, restaurant and board house keeper as well, so the tax hits the oleo from the time it is manufactured down to the time it is consumed.

The bill had a divided report and an ineffectual effort to put over the minority report against the bill was followed by a successful effort to adopt the majority report and put the bill onto the calendar.

## SILVERTON WILL GET ITS ARMORY

Lachmund Bill Carrying Ten Thousand Dollars Is Put by the House Yesterday

The bill carrying an appropriation of 10,000 for an armory at Silverton passed the house yesterday and is now practically a law. The bill was introduced in the senate by Senator Lachmund and had no difficulty in passing that body. Only a few scattering votes were registered against it in the house yesterday. Silverton has one of the best, if not the best, military organizations of any town of its size in the state and the armory was considered a decidedly needed asset to the town.

## SALARIES FOR BROWN FIXED

Attorney General Will Be Given More Latitude With His Assistants

Attorney General Brown will be allowed to rearrange the salaries of his office soon and to give his assistants a possible boost, under an arrangement incorporated in a bill which passed the house yesterday. The bill had already passed the senate and there is little doubt that it will become a law.
