OREGON STATE NEWS BROUGHT UP TO MINUTE

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—National leaders in the Methodist Episcopal church conferred here today with the Methodists of Portland and Oregon on the plans and scope of the world wide centenary movement.

He main objects of the drive under way, as set forth at today's meeting, are: The raising of a fund of \$100,000,000 within the next five years for church work; large extensions of home and foreign missionary work; the expenditure of \$20,000,000 in reconstruction work in Europe; the pledging of 17,000,000 Methodist tithe and the consecration of 53,000 young people to life service for the church.

Three sessions were held today and three banquets were given to-night, one for each clergyman, laymen and women of the church. The conference will continue through the week.

Among leaders in the movement here for the conference are Dr. Christian F. Reiser, C. S. Ward, Dr. John W. Hancher, E. O. Excell and Dr. Fred H. Sheets.
