

## RETURNING TO CIVILIAN LIFE

Lieutenant-Colonel Roosevelt Still Suffering from His Wound

NEW YORK, March 6.—Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, who went to France in the summer of 1917 a major in the 26th Infantry and who subsequently commanded that regiment, returned today a casual on the steamship Mauretania. Colonel Roosevelt is still suffering slightly from a machine gun bullet wound in the leg.

"I am very glad to get home," he said, "and to see my children whom I have not seen for two years. My only plan for the immediate future is to get out of the army as soon as possible and return to civilian life." Lieutenant Roosevelt was mentioned in United States army orders for gallantry in leading his troops in action at Catigny in May, 1918, and also received the French war cross with palms for bravery under fire.

## NATION LEAGUE IS PLAYED BY SENATOR REED

Democrat of Missouri Asserts Liberty of World Would Be Endangered

## NEW YORKERS WARNED

Monroe Doctrine Would Be Destroyed Is Claim Made in Address

NEW YORK, March 6.—Senator Reed of Missouri, Democrat, speaking before the Arts and Sciences association here tonight, declared the American people had been either intentionally or ignorantly misled regarding the league of nations and urged that the proposed constitution be given careful study before its acceptance.

"The scheme is revolutionary and dangerous to the last degree," said Senator Reed. "The powers granted to the executive council, and which may be exercised by five men, are stupendous, dangerous and appalling. Their misuse might result in destruction of the liberty of the world—in the crushing of the American republic—in the creation of an international despotism worse than has ever cursed the earth or any single nation thereof."

Senator Reed said any claim that the league would not destroy the Monroe doctrine was either "made in ignorance or is dishonestly made." He declared the world league as planned would embroil America in all world wars and political intrigue destroy its sovereignty and compel service of its armed forces in all parts of the world.

"The acceptance by the United States of the proposed constitution of the league of nations may involve the very life of the republic," said Mr. Reed. "It is high time patriots should arouse themselves."

"An attempt is being made to drive it through to a conclusion before the American people have an opportunity to read its provisions or dig out of them the hidden and sinister purposes of the undertaking."

"The people have been taught that the league is merely an amicable agreement by which the world shall remain at peace. They have been told that unless the league is consummated the world will be immediately involved in a chaos of war that will destroy the very foundations of society and civilization. People are taught that they can receive the benefits of this league without involving our country in any serious obligations."

"I affirm that it is in fact proposed to set up a world government which will have control over all international matters as completely as the federal government now has jurisdiction over questions affecting the states of the union."

"Moreover, it will have jurisdiction of domestic matters which in the opinion of the majority of the league may tend to produce difficulties out of which war may spring."

"The seat of this league will be in fact the capital of the world. The construction of the league is essentially autocratic. The powers are so highly centralized and so ut-

terly without balances, checks, or safeguards, as to be repugnant to all forms of democracy."

## GUERRILLA WAR DESCRIBED BY BALTIMORE MAN

Conditions Where Americans Face Bolsheviki Described by Officer

## POPULACE IS WON OVER

Relief Organizations Receive Praise from Red Cross Authority

NEW YORK, March 6.—Conditions in northern Russia, where American and allied forces are facing the Bolsheviki, were described by Major C. T. Williams of Baltimore, a member of the American Red Cross relief expedition to Russia, and Captain Wynand Pyle, of Detroit, an army medical officer, upon their arrival here today on the transport Mauretania.

Major Williams said he had traveled 1,500 miles by sled in Russia since last December, visiting all the fronts where American and allied troops are conducting what he called a "blockhouse warfare." Major Williams left New York last August with a cargo of Red Cross supplies for Archangel.

The Red Cross, in cooperation with army authorities, he said, has established a 100-bed hospital for the Americans at Archangel, and is issuing a weekly paper.

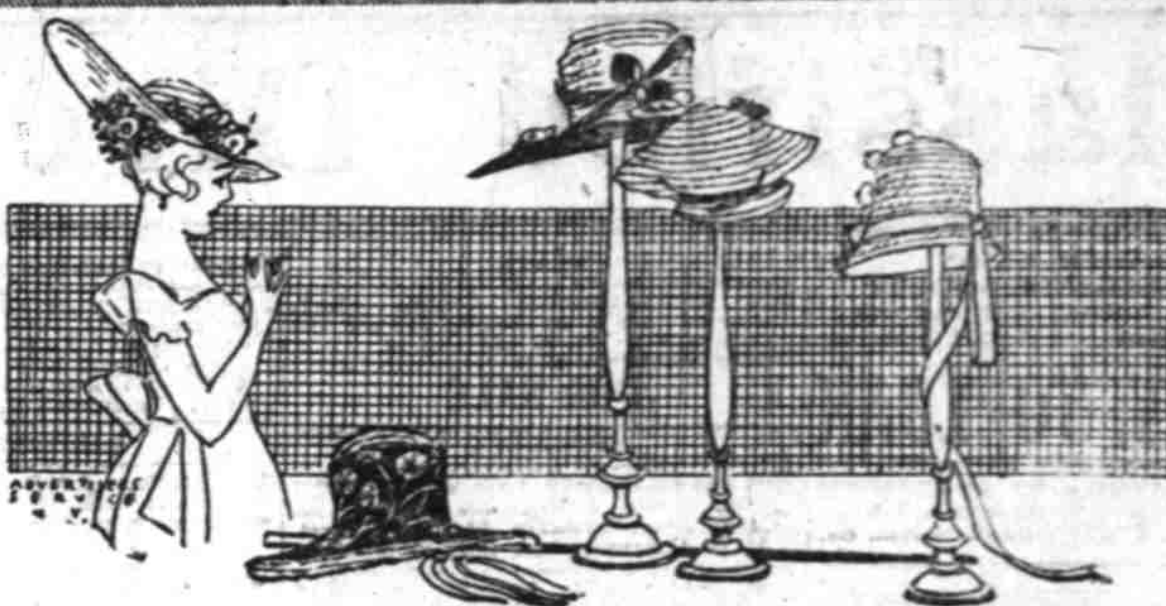
In addition to the work of the soldiers, he said, the Red Cross had dispatched relief expeditions by pack sled to many isolated villages where natives were found to be near starvation and was supplying mid-day meals to more than 1000 school children in Archangel.

"All Americans," said Major Williams, "are popular with the Russians, but none more so than the American soldiers billeted in peasant homes, who by their friendly attitude, particularly to the children are winning a way straight to the hearts of the populace."

Captain Pyle, who has spent the last six months in Russia as medical officer of the 329th Infantry, left Archangel in charge of a detachment of 22 sick and wounded, the party buffeting its way on an ice breaker for four days to Murmansk, where they were taken to Scotland on a transport.

The American soldiers in Russia, he said, accepted their duty "with the same spirit that characterizes them on the battlefields of France." The fighting, he added, was for the most part guerrilla warfare, in which machine guns played a large part. He was emphatic in his praise of the work of the Red Cross, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. in Russia. Sixty-two nurses, members of the Presbyterian hospital unit of Chicago, were passengers on the Mauretania, all having served at least eight months in France and some of them in Russia and Belgium. Of the number returning, seven have been cited for bravery by the British and French governments and one, Miss Annie Hansen, has been cited by France, Belgium and Russia. Miss Hansen went abroad before the United States entered the war and served 13 months in Russia.
