ogize the civil service commission and the fact that he had asked for the resignation of two members—Harlow W. Craven and Charles M. Galloway—became known today with the announcement at the White House of the appointment of two new commissioners, Martin A. Morrison of Indiana and George R. Wales of Vermont.

One vacancy in the commission already existed, John A. McIlhenny having resigned several weeks ago to accept a position in Haiti, but as Mr. Galloway's resignation has not yet been received at the White House, the appointment of the third member was not announced.

The letters asking for the resignations of Commissioners Galloway and Craven were dispatched just before the president left on his return trip to France and were said to have contained no reason for their request. Mr. Galloway would make no statement tonight but said that he might have something to say tomorrow.

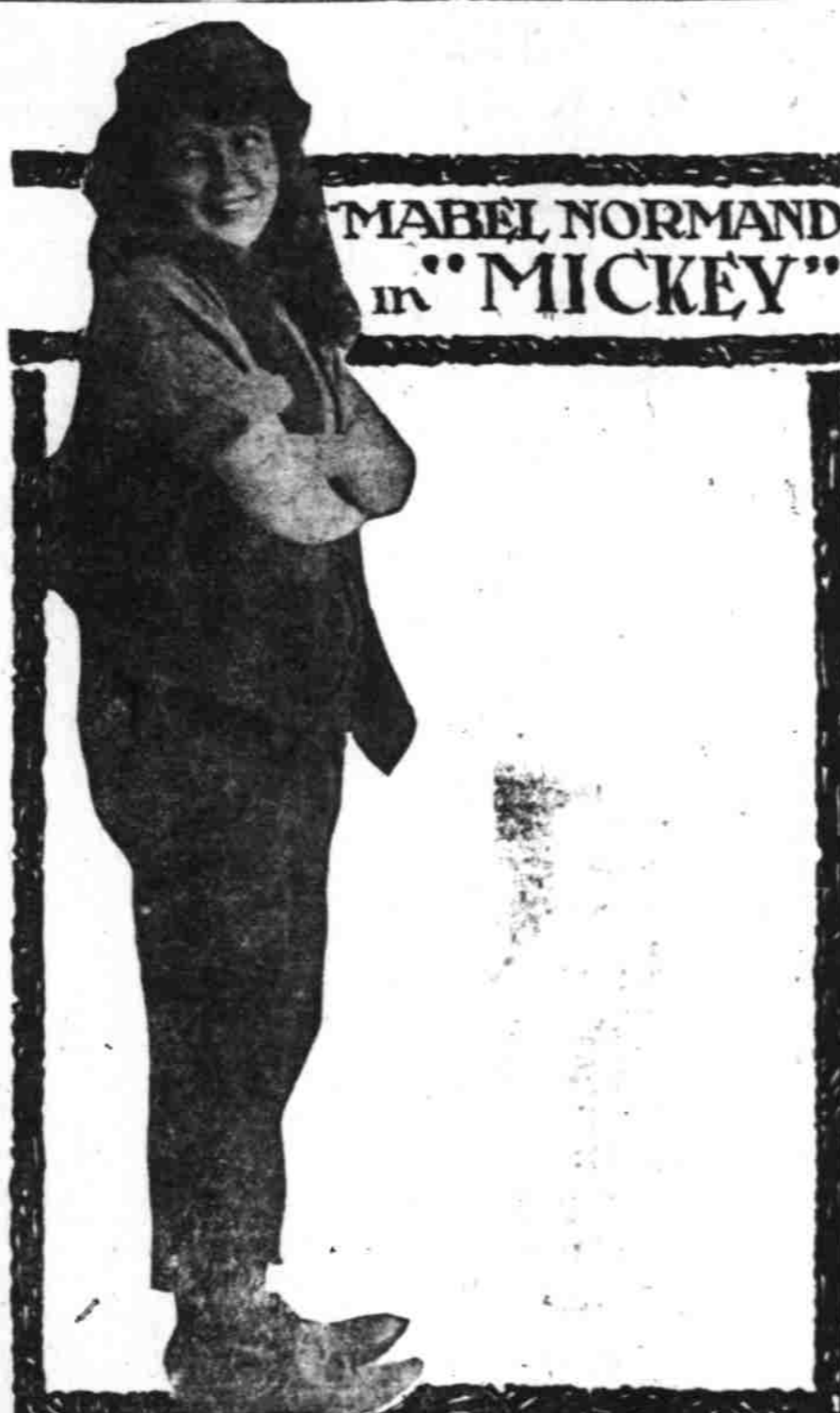

No explanation of the president's decision to reorganize the commission was given.

### STOCK DEALS VERY ACTIVE

Transactions on Exchange Run Well Over Million-Share Mark Yesterday

NEW YORK, March 12.—Transactions in stocks today again ran well over the million share mark, the advance, which embraced numerous high points for the year, being accelerated, according to general belief, by substantial public participation.

Influential factors included news advices from abroad which strengthened the hope of an early ratification of the peace treaty and virtually assurance of funds for efficient maintenance of the railroads.

Additional developments bore upon favorable crop prospects and further improvement in general trade.

Rails led the strong opening, but fell back quite generally in the final hour. United States steel also reacting sharply after attaining a new high for the current movement, but the undertone at the close was strong. Sales amounted to 1,255,000 shares.

Bonds were neglected in the excitement attending the stock market, but a study to firm tone ruled in domestic and foreign issues on relatively light dealings. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$5,550,000. Old United States coupon and registered fours gained a quarter per cent on call.

### AMENDMENTS BY STRAUS DOWNED

Effort to Change League of Nations Covenant Are Not Welcomed

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, March 12.—The efforts of Oscar Straus of the American league to enforce peace to have the league of nations union favor an amendment to the league of nations covenant designed to safeguard the Monroe doctrine failed today. The French and English delegates, who dominated the conference, pleaded that the subject was too far-reaching for quick action, while the Chinese protested that it too vitally affected them.

Mr. Straus proposed an amendment to article 10 providing that should two nations threaten war on each other, the nearest great power "in the first instance" was obligated to step in without calling for the assistance of the other great powers. Should this great power fail, then it would be a matter for the entire league's fighting forces to handle.

The British proposal that article 16 be changed to make any nation which breaks the covenant liable to war with all the other members of the league, rather than merely committing an act of war as the covenant provides, was defeated on the plea of Mr. Straus, who maintained that it conflicted with the constitution of the United States, whereupon the other delegates said they were glad to drop the matter as

### VASSAR WOMEN ASSIGNED WORK

Seven Take Charge of Relief Organization at Verdun, Is Report

NEW YORK, March 12.—Seven young women sent to France as a Red Cross unit organized by Vassar college have been designated by the French government to take charge of relief work at Verdun, it was announced here tonight. They will begin Saturday the relief of refugees who have been forbidden until now to return to the desolate district.

The group is under the direction of Miss Margaret Lambie of New York City. It includes a trained dietitian, Miss Marian R. Meyers, of Rochester, N. Y., a public health nurse, Miss Margaret Tupper, of Cleveland and the following trained social service workers: Miss Helena G. Bradford, of Cleveland; Miss Elinor P. Buddon, of Brookline, Mass.; Miss Ruth H. Tuttle, of Horrell, N. Y., and Miss Lida A. Little, of California, who acts as secretary of the unit.

### BRITISH TROOPS REBEL ON SHIP

Reported to Have Threatened to Sink Vessel Unless Put Ashore

HALIFAX, March 12.—When the transport Tolosa docked here today with her captain reporting a threat by 293 British troops in her steerage to sink the vessel unless they were put ashore and given transportation to their homes in the United States, steamship officials went aboard to interview the complaining soldiers.

They found that 50 of the men had sufficient funds to cover their railroad fares and immigration head taxes, which were reported to have been insisted upon by American immigration authorities. The others, it was stated, would be held aboard the ship, which will sail Friday for New York, whither she was bound, after discharging Canadian troops here when a wireless message recalled her to Halifax to coal, because of the harbor strike at the American port. This order keeping the men aboard was issued in spite of fears expressed by Captain Jackson of violence by the soldiers.

The troops, most of whom enlisted in the British forces from the United States and 81 of whom are American born, were discharged from the army with \$20, and an order to the British consular officials in New York for transportation to their homes, the ship's officers said. Gambling among the men, they added, had left most of the funds in the hands of a few.

### MAY TURN DOWN HUN SHIPPING

United States May Not Accept Hundred Thousand Tons in Chilean Waters

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The American government may not accept the 100,000 or more tons of German shipping in Chilean waters, allocated to it by the allied shipping commission. Chairman Hurley of the shipping board said tonight that final action would depend upon both the condition of the grant and the ships.

Mr. Hurley explained that the original proposal, made when he was in Europe, was for the United States to take over the ships and use them until the peace treaty was signed, when title to them would be determined. This offer was refused by Mr. Hurley, who believed that "the use for so short a period would not justify the board in standing the expense of the repairs."

Information that the ships finally had been allocated to this country has just been received at the state department. Mr. Hurley immediately ordered an examination of the vessels to determine the extent of repairs that would have to be made. Since the vessels have been tied up for more than four years, most officials believe that their engines are in very bad shape and that their hulls also have been more or less damaged.

The exact conditions under which the ships have not yet been transmitted to the shipping board. If these should provide for the use of the vessels until peace is proclaimed, some officials said they would not be acceptable as it would require several months to put the craft into commission.

### HOLD OUT FOR HALF HOLIDAY

Leader of Striking Machinists Asserts Shipping Board Sanctions It

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—That the United States shipping board has agreed to the Saturday half holiday for shipbuilding mechanics was the statement here today of Edward D. Nola, president of the machinists' lodge, all of whom are idle because of differences over this concession. Before leaving for Washington yesterday, R. H. Brotherton, special district industrial examiner for the shipping board, announced that the meeting he will attend on March 17 of ship trades unions and government officials to draw up new wage agreements, would undoubtedly provide for the Saturday half holiday.

Between 9,000 and 10,000 shipyard mechanics in the San Francisco bay region were dismissed for refusing to forego the Saturday half holiday until existing agreements shall expire on April 1.

A delegation of the California Metal Trades association, the organization of employers, departed for

the Washington meeting today. There also will be a large union labor representation from this section.

The machinists were negotiating today with one big Oakland yard to have the men return to work on a proposition of continuing the Saturday half holiday.
