SHAW TO HEAD SOLDIER HOME

Appointment of Successor to Markee Is Made by the Board of Control

The state board of control yesterday received officially the resignation of Commandant R. C. Markee of the Oregon Soldiers' home at Roseburg, and straightway appointed to succeed him Captain James P. Shaw of Milwaukie, Clackamas county.

The resignation of Commandant Markee, was received by the board in the following letter:

"I hereby tender my resignation as commandant of the Oregon state soldiers' home at Roseburg.

"If in your judgment my services as commandant have not at all times and under all circumstances during my incumbency been eminently satisfactory, I trust you will accept this proffer and release me at your earliest convenience.

"In retiring from the management of this home I do so in full knowledge that at all times and under all circumstances my very best efforts have been exerted in a desire to make for the 'old boys' a home in fact as well as in name. That I have succeeded is evidenced by the fact that I am held in highest esteem by a majority of the resident members.

The resignation of Commandant Markee obviates a hearing that was scheduled to take place before the board of control next Saturday at which certain complaints against the management of the soldiers' home were to be aired.

Governor Olcott said that Captain Shaw, the new appointee, was not a candidate for the position at this time, but that he was a candidate in 1915 when Mr. Markee was appointed. He will assume the position at Roseburg as soon as arrangements can be made to turn over the affairs of the institution.

Captain Shaw, the new commander, is well known in Oregon, where he has lived for more than 40 years. He was formerly department commander of the Grand Army of the Republic for Oregon and has been a member of the G. A. R. for 45 years. He was a pioneer manufacturer and a business man of the state of many years' standing.

Captain Shaw served through the war of the rebellion from April 10, wounds during his service and was voted a medal of honor from the state from which he enlisted. He was one of the commissioners from Oregon to the centennial celebration of the Battle of Gettysburg held in Pennsylvania, and also has received other marks of recognition by this state and by the organization with which he has long been connected.

Mrs. Shaw, who will probably become matron of the home with the advent of the new commandant, has been at the head of many schools of the state, and also has acted as supervisor of the schools for Clackamas county.

The name of Captain Shaw has received warm approval from men of the highest standing in connection with the Grand Army of the Republic and from others. Aside from having practical business experience and experience as an executive head, he also has a working knowledge of agriculture, which is considered one of the qualifications for successful administration of an institution of the nature of the soldier's home.

GOTHAM LINES MAY BE TIED BY STRIKERS

Complete Paralysis of Harbor Shipping Threatened by Developments

PETITION GOVERNMENT

Appeals Forwarded to Washington Describe Situation as Critical

NEW YORK, March 12.—A complete tie-up of New York city's subway, elevated and surface car lines, as well as paralysis of its harbor shipping is threatened by the strike of harbor workers which has been in progress more than a week, it was asserted today.

Frank Hedley, general manager of the Interborough Rapid Transit and allied lines, declared that unless coal barges are moved at once, a shutdown of transportation on Manhattan island will result. Freight is piling up at piers and the movement of trans-Atlantic and coastwise shipping has been demoralized.

"The last regular delivery of coal was made to the Interborough a week ago yesterday," Mr. Hedley said. "While we have been able to get a few loads here and there, the total amount has been far from sufficient to keep the lines running. We require about 2000 tons a day and if we cannot get it in some way we will have to suspend operations."

The appeals to Washington today described the situation as "critical" and called for federal intervention by the commandeering of tugboats.

The wholesale coal dealers association telegraphed Secretary of War Baker, yesterday, petitioning him to seize enough equipment to coal troop ships tied up here.

While these appeals were going forward the situation was further complicated by an announcement by Matthew McConville, head of the Hoisting Engineers' union, that his organization would support the strikers if coal barges were manned by non-union labor.

A statement by the Longshoremen's association said that unless federal government intervenes it would be impossible to load a vessel in New York harbor.

All efforts towards a settlement of the strike were suspended today pending return of James L. Hughes, federal mediator. The war labor board issued a statement in Washington in which it said that while it could not change or enforce the award of V. Everit Macy, its umpire, which resulted in renewal of the strike, it would not object to an adjustment of the controversy through the office of Mr. Hughes even by a modification of the award.

The Boat Owners association declared it would meet the strikers through their union leaders, and the marine workers affiliation flatly refused the employers suggestions for a joint conciliation committee to discuss grievances.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—As a step looking to the settlement of the boat workers' strike in New York harbor, the war and navy departments today agreed as far as existing contracts will permit to approve for men employed on army and navy floating property at New York working conditions and wages agreed on between the railroad administration and marine workers at that port.

Neither of the departments had been affected by the strike, their workers remaining on the job, but James L. Hughes, the federal mediator, felt this action by the department would greatly relieve the entire situation. He also has suggested that the shipping board take similar action, but the board has reached no decision.

POINDEXTER HAS WORD ON PEACE

Washington Senator Glad It Isn't Necessary to Wait League of Nations

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Senator Poindexter of Washington, one of the 29 Republican senators who approved the resolution of Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, opposing the proposed constitution of the league of nations, issued a statement tonight asserting that "the most refreshing news for the suffering millions of the world is the announcement that definite preliminary terms of peace have been agreed upon and that peace will no longer be delayed while awaiting decision of a league of nations."

"The wisest decision reached by the peace conference," Senator Poindexter said, "is that the treaty of peace, restoring order and happiness to the world, is to be kept separate and distinct from the league for the conduct of future wars.

COMPTON IS BACK IN TOWN

Lieutenant Says He Will Be Here to Stay—May Take Former Position

"Indeed I am coming back to Salem to stay" were just about the first words Lieutenant L. H. Compton uttered when he got off the 4 o'clock Oregon Electric train in Salem yesterday.

Lieutenant Compton, plump, rosy and smiling, just as his old friends used to know him, is back from France, his last duty in the war being the pleasant one of accompanying to Camp Lewis what remains of the old L and M companies of the Third Oregon or 182nd Infantry. As soon as he had delivered his command at the cantonment Saturday morning he left on a furlough for his old home town, where he is to be the guest until March 18 of Mr. and Mrs. John Farror.

The lieutenant is among the advance guard to reach the city. He feels confident that 30 or 40 men will come in probably Friday. The rest of the 150 who left here over a year ago have been transferred to other companies, and for the most part, still in France, he believes.

A real veteran in more ways than one is Lieutenant Compton. He saw service first in the Philippines, then went to the border with the Third Oregon, where he was a member of the staff of Lieutenant Colonel Abrams. He went to France in the same capacity. He was wounded in Champagne on October 4, being struck in the left arm by a machine gun bullet and in the left leg by a piece of shrapnel. Besides this he had the unpleasant experience of going through a gas attack and feeling the effects.

Lieutenant Compton before his enlistment was general secretary of the Salem Y. M. C. A., which position has been held open for him in his absence. It is not known yet whether he will go into this work again upon receiving his discharge.

Mrs. Compton, who has been at Everett, Wn., did not accompany her husband to Salem by reason of the
