PUNISH GUILTY ONES GERMAN GENERAL SAYS

Marshal Von Buelow Favors Retribution for Those Who Started War

PLEA FOR NATION MADE

Justice, Not Mercy, Asked for Fatherland by Kaiser's Former Henchman

AMSTERDAM, March 5.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—"It is the right of our enemies to punish those responsible if there are men on the German side who are to blame for this war," declared Field Marshal Von Buelow, retired, in an interview with the Berlin correspondent of the Handelsblad. Von Buelow commanded the Second Germany army in 1914, which was engaged in the fighting near Mauthausen and was retired in 1915 owing to a paralytic stroke from which he has not yet quite recovered.

"As an old soldier I have not learned to ask for mercy," continued the field marshal. "I only ask for justice for the German people. We soldiers went out to fight by the Kaiser's orders because the government said the country was in danger. It was not our task as soldiers to investigate. If we had been told the truth our duty was merely to obey. If the German people were misled when they were told that they were assailed by a superior number of enemies, then may a curse be on those who, by false dealings, made three-quarters of mankind the enemies of a great peace-loving people. If there are wretches who deceived us when they said we were attacked, then they deserve the severest punishment, whoever they may be.

"But to destroy a great nation because it is misled by a few people is to sin against the spirit of Human Justice."

The field marshal who is one of the founders of the society called the German Society for Civic Education, declared that Germany was now

in the throes of a moral revolution. The materialistic philosophy, he said, would give way to a new one which would be crowned by the victory of the social idea.

"The one aim of the German Society for Civic Education," he said, "is to bring the German people back to the religion of human love. We ask all the intellectual and moral leaders in the world to join us in forming an international community. It was the materialistic and mechanical conception of the world which ruined Germany. It will also destroy our enemies if they do not see that it is the spirit of the citizens which constructs a state."

STUDENTS GET ARMY TRAINING

Government's Plan Will Supercede That of State in Oregon Schools

Military equipment including uniforms, will be furnished by the government to military companies in the larger high schools of the state under a plan of the government for military training as made known to State Superintendent Churchill. Colonel Howard of the United States army has apprised superintendent Churchill of the plan and Mr. Churchill is furnishing an outline to principals and city superintendents of the state.

Wherever the plan is worked out it will supercede the program previously made by the state department of education under an enactment of the legislature of 1917 under which the state is supposed to furnish equipment, but which it is usually unable to do so because it has no equipment to furnish.

The government's plan provides that any high school that has 100 boys or more may make application for permission to offer military work. If the government approves the application all equipment including uniforms, will be furnished without cost to the district and an army officer will be detailed by the government to give the course and will be reimbursed for his services by the government. In the larger schools a corporal will be detailed to assist the army officer.

There is a possibility that the plan may be made to cover high schools where not more than 50 boys can be furnished for military training and Colonel Howard advises that such districts make their applications so they may be accommodated if a ruling of this kind is made.

Colonel Howard commended military work already being done in the high schools of Salem, Eugene and other points.

WELCOME FUND BEING SPENT

O. C. Leiter of New York Sends Report of Welcome Committee

Money is now being expended from the \$100,000 appropriation of the legislature for the welcome of Oregon soldiers arriving in New York from the campaign against the Hun overseas, says a report that has been received by Governor Olcott from O. C. Leiter, chairman of the Oregon Welcome committee in New York. The report says that the Oregon men are drifting in at the rate of 25 or 30 a day and that money for their entertainment is being expended with care.

"We are all organized and going now," says the report. Have opened a modest headquarters, and have received some money in addition to the state appropriation. Will handle this very carefully and in accordance with the spirit of the appropriation.

The boys are drifting in now 25 and 30 a day, and we are doing all that we can to cheer them up and make them realize that the people of Oregon are still with them and back of them.

"I attended a meeting the other day of all the chairmen of state committees in New York. There were 35 states represented so you see that we are not alone in this work. I believe that we will do some good work. We have done a good deal already. The boys seem delighted to meet Oregon people and to have a little place of their own to go to. The ladies are calling on the wounded men in the hospitals, we help the boys get discharges if they need them from the army and navy, make little advances to men temporarily out of funds which so far all have been paid back, and be of as much practical assistance as we can to them.

"It is very difficult to handle a volunteer proposition, which this is largely, although we have put on a manager now, a former Salvation army worker, who understands soldiers, whom we are paying out of Mayor Baker's fund."
