Salem Lags Behind in Armenian-Syrian Relief

Although the city has been thoroughly canvassed by members of the Armenian-Syrian relief fund drive committee, Salem is still \$2000 behind on its quota of \$6000. The scanty sums donated to the work and the number of refusals the workers have encountered are blamed for the deficit. Similar results have been obtained elsewhere in the county and but three of four towns have earned in reports. Teams which handled the monthly collection of Red Cross funds conducted the present campaign.
