

FISHING LOOKS BEST IN YEARS

Thomas and Mill Creeks Expected to Draw Many; Santiam Is Clear

Fishing promises to be better this year than for several seasons, according to anglers and the condition is held largely due to the closing during the winter of the season on all game fish, as result of the action of the last legislature. This is the first season when such a condition has been true and as the streams have been heavily stocked, fishermen are anticipating good catches. Thomas creek is expected to be one of the most popular streams when the season opens on April 1, as it has been closed for two years and during that time has been liberally restocked. Mill creek is another stream where many will go as

reports have it that it is full of fish. A small confluence exists in the Santiam river which is clear this year at the opening of the season. The Santiam is accessible and with clear water will probably attract sportsmen in large numbers. For the latter end of the season, the Nestucca will be one of the most fished streams, in all likelihood, as the road work on the Grande Ronde will have been completed by that time. Heretofore, the bad stretch of road for a distance of about four miles on the Grande Ronde has prevented access to the country for many. Road work being done will put the Nestucca within three and a half hours of Salem by automobile. This will enhance the attractiveness of the streams in the vicinity for late fall fishing and will enable Salem anglers to indulge in the sport for the entire season with hope of reward for every trip.

GREEN GETS NOT GUILTY VERDICT

Brakeman Freed by Jury in Case Involving Young High School Girl

Twenty hours deliberation was taken by the jury in the case of the state against Roy Green, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, which was heard in circuit court Wednesday before a verdict of not guilty was brought in. The verdict was signed by 11 men, the other man of the jury holding out for a conviction. The attorneys in the case, however, had stipulated that they would accept a verdict brought by 11 men.

The jury went out at 4 p. m. Wednesday and returned their verdict at noon yesterday. Green was accused of improper advances towards Golda Todd, a 15-year-old high school girl. He is a brakeman on the Oregon Electric railway.

SALEM SOLDIERS GO TO PRESIDIO

Capt. Cloyd Rauch and Other Men of 363d Infantry Start Home

Salem men in the 363d infantry which has just returned from France will not be able to see their homes before being discharged but will go at once from their eastern camp to the Presidio, San Francisco, Calif., where they will be mustered out. The information was contained in a telegram received yesterday by J. E. McCroskey, secretary of the Commercial club from Senator Charles L. McNary.

Among the men in the detachment is Captain Cloyd Rauch, former court reporter for the circuit court. Captain Rauch was in a number of battles while in France, the most notable being in the Argonne forest.

Advance of Flour Pat in Effect by Millers

PORTLAND, Ore., March 27.—An advance of 40c a barrel in the price of flour was put in effect by millers here today, this being the first increase since the food administration relinquished control of the flouring industry. As a result the quotations on patents are \$11.20 a barrel at the mill and \$11.45 delivered, increased cost of wheat, caused by addition of a premium of 14c a bushel to take care of carrying charges, is given by millers as the reason for the present advance.

CAPTURED GUNS TO COME HERE

Victory Loan Special Will Have Tanks and Many Other Trophies

German field pieces, French mosquito tanks, heavy guns and rifles of the German, French and American armies, shells, sabers, gas masks and all sorts of equipment will be seen in Salem on the Victory loan special when it comes to this city early in April. The exact date will be announced later.

The French mosquito tank in the exhibit was badly damaged by a German shell, two of the occupants being killed. The field pieces include a French "75" and German pieces ranging in size from 76 to 150 millimeters. There is a lot of barbed wire from Verdun and parts of Hun airplanes, trench stoves, a Turkish bayonet, and scores of other small trophies.

Salem will be the second city in Oregon to see the exhibit, being preceded only by Portland.

SUIT FOR HEART BALM ON TODAY

M. S. Hall Alleges Wife's Affections Worth \$10,000 to Him

Affections of his wife, Lillian Hall, are valued at \$10,000 by M. S. Hall, according to the allegations set forth in his suit against Fred Denham which is to come up for hearing in circuit court today.

Hall alleges in his complaint that prior to November, 1918 he and his wife were living happily together and that about that time Denham appeared and through his influence over Mrs. Hall won her away from her husband. Hall charges that the loss to him is worth the amount asked in the suit.

The couple lived in Washington but it is said that Mrs. Hall came to this city to visit relatives and that Denham also came to this vicinity. Because of the residence of the defendant in Marion county, the suit was filed in the local circuit court.

DEADLOCK IN METAL UNION

Pacific Coast Shipbuilders and Employees Fail Again to Reach Decision

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Pacific coast shipbuilders and delegates of the metal trades unions failed again today to reach any decision on a proposal that union men should be given preference in employment under the new working agreement now being formulated. While the Pacific coast men were in conference, Atlantic and Gulf shipyard owners and metal trades delegates opened a conference also with the view of adopting a new agreement. Among the Pacific coast men, a deadlock apparently has been reached. Neither men nor employers indicated a willingness to recede or compromise, according to the conferees. The east coast men made fair progress, however, establishing a board of employees and officers of the international unions to serve as conciliatory body to act on disputes, discussion of working conditions proposed to be included in an agreement, followed without any final action being taken.

President O'Connell of the metal trades department of the American Federation of Labor tonight said he expected that final action would be taken on the Pacific coast agreement tomorrow but would not venture a prediction as to whether an agreement would be reached; the conference adjourned without drawing up any agreement.

Shake-ups in Bowling Tournament Frequent

TOLEDO, March 27.—Shake-ups were frequent in the minor events of the American Bowling Congress tournament here today. On one of the afternoon shifts, Mort Lindsey of New Haven, Conn., bowled into first place in the all-events, scoring 1933 for his nine tournament games and going ahead of Frank Caragna, in that division by five pins. One of the morning shifts O. Kallusch and E. Barnes of Rochester rolled into first place in the two-men departments with a score of 1205.

the result of these inquiries has not been wholly encouraging to the advocates of the amendment but that they would be continued until the attitude of all the delegates is ascertained.

Since the first mention of the desire of the Japanese to secure an amendment recognizing equality before the law for all national of the league of nations states in other countries, the Japanese delegates have not pressed their amendment before the commission itself. They have, however, been canvassing the delegations with various forms of such an amendment, endeavoring to find out the feeling toward it.

They ran squarely on one reef today when Premier Hughes of Australia declared without qualification that the Australian delegation would not support or stand in favor of any amendment of any kind whatever containing the Japanese desires.

The Japanese amendment did not come before the committee last night.

An important amendment adopted last night provides for the creation of a committee on organization of the league which is to be empowered to proceed with arrangements for the assembly, securing the necessary buildings and perfecting the secretariat of offices, in advance of the ratification of the treaty, but the acts of this committee will be subject to the approval of the ratifying body.

The purpose is to speed up the beginning of the workings of the great league to meet the critical situation that are now arising throughout the world.

Another amendment gathers into one section all of the separate conventions which are to be incorporated into the covenant, such as those relating to labor, commerce and finance, so that these are not made a part of the treaty, but that the covenants set forth therein. This would leave the league only to execute the terms of such conventions as may be agreed upon by the separate states.

Provision is to be made for similar treatment of other conventions on other subjects, such as white slavery and the opium traffic, which are likely hereafter to be inserted in the covenant.

The language of the mandatory article has been changed so as to make it clear that no nation shall be obliged to act as a mandatory.

Generally the language of the whole covenant has been clarified, particularly article 1 to meet the charge of Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, New York, of ungrammatical language and the words "high contracting parties" appear now only in that one article.

PARIS, March 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—The super-council of the president and the premiers, now known as the council of four, divided its labors today to meet the "White House" and M. Clemenceau's private office, adjoining the war office.

The Franco-German frontier was the chief topic of discussion, this following up an agreement reached last night on reparations for war damages. It is understood that this agreement includes the vital point of the total amount of indemnity, which will not be announced at present, as likely to cause discussion and arouse hostility in enemy quarters.

It is noted as a coincidence that a German financial commission is being chosen to come to Versailles, where the settlement of this branch may include all interests.

The frontier questions committee discussed the disposition of the Saar valley coal regions and the west bank of the Rhine. The territorial experts have said their last word and frankly declare that it is a question now of political expediency, on which the super-council alone can pass.

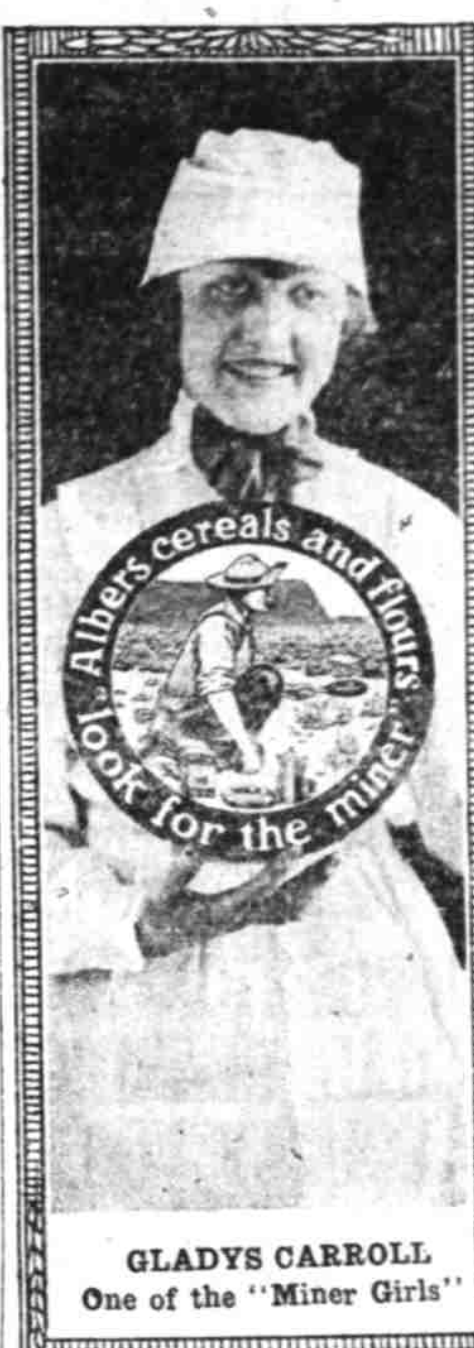

archduke was rather a friend of Serbia in hatred of the Magyars as he knew of the conspiracy between the Berlin and Budapest governments.

"It is shown from letters that when Aehrenthal (Austrian-Hungarian foreign minister) annexed Bosnia in 1909 and Serbia protested through Russia and was supported by England, Count Czernin had an audience with Francis Ferdinand. The latter was against war with Serbia as the powers would say 'Halt' after Serbia was overthrown and nothing would be gained in such a war. But Count Hottendorf, the chief of staff, was strongly for war. The Austro-Hungarian general staff was strongly under the influence of the German general staff.

It is also shown: (1) That a strong centralized Austria under Francis Ferdinand was too strong a barrier against German expansion towards the Far East. Francis Ferdinand started to centralize his power first with the creation of a ministry of the imperial court, of which the intention was to offset Magyar power.

(2) That there was a strong opposition against the direct, secret and common electoral right for Austria and Hungary.

(3) That there was a fusion of all aristocrats and landlords in Austria and Hungary for the support of the emperor against the people's rights and social demands. Despotism was shown to return under Francis Ferdinand. The emperor and the aristocrats with other landlords wanted to rule. In Hungary, Count Tisza, and a certain Mr. Kristoff were the secret supporters of Francis Ferdinand through Count Czernin. Other Hungarian aristocrats, according to documents, were pro-German (and called 'rebels' by Francis Ferdinand). "Again Francis Ferdinand was dangerous to the German emperor and his aspirations. Emperor William feared and hated the SERB, but liked the Magyars. He said that Francis Ferdinand was too rabid toward the Magyars and tried to influence him. "A way via German Austria and Hungary to the Far East was natural as the Magyars had aspirations for Bosnia and Herzegovina. The Magyars with a German prince as their king (Kaiser Frederick) would have been the best allies of William II. And the pro-German and pro-Austrian general staff with Count Hottendorf at its head is another connecting link with the aspirations of the Germans in the Far East. The war has proved all this. The old Austrian emperor and Emperor Charles were too stupid to see the real cause of the war and the aims of the Germans and the Magyars. "There are letters of interesting details of political talks of Count Czernin and Emperor William in 1906. William said: "All Europe has to unite economically against America." "It may interest you to know that Count Czernin is still working with Emperor Charles for the re-establishment of the Hapsburg throne. The documents we have on hand will make both emperors, German as well as Austrian, absolutely impossible among their own peoples when they are published. They will expose the intrigues of the Hapsburgs against the German imperial family as well as the intrigues of Emperor William against the Hapsburgs."
