It is evident to any one who knows anything of dairying that it is a losing proposition at present, and the temptation to false economy is very strong, Many are yielding, and ceasing to feed grain. I did not realize this till a few days ago, when two country bankers, each independently, asked me why the men with the cows could follow such a mistaken policy. There was no doubt at all in either of their minds as to the extreme lack of wisdom in such a course. With green grass almost in sight, they felt that production should surely be kept up so as to get some profit from the cheaper pasturage. If the milk flow is gone, most assuredly all chance of profit is gone too. Why should the dairyman sell his heritage for a mess of

pottage"? When the season breaks in a month or six weeks feed costs should take a permanent change for the better. Let us so arrange our business that we will be enabled to take full advantage of it. We need every advantage that we can get.

The difference between the successful dairyman and the "cowkeeper" is in his confidence in his cattle. Indeed, the difference between the successful and the unsuccessful in any line of business is in the nerve to do the very best you can now (regardless of immediate circumstances) and build broadly and right for the future. No good herd, no profitable dairy business was ever built without its periods of 'pocketing its losses" and looking steadfastly ahead. Anybody can feed when he can see an immediate profit. It takes a real man to withstand the temptation to skimp a little in adversity. Remember, it is the business itself, and not a few dollars saved for a time alone, that returns the profit. Always remember that the feed
