It is felt that tardiness is an important habit to discourage among the youngsters and that its elimination will be a great benefit in later years.

EGGS IN WATERGLASS.

Only clean fresh eggs should be used for water glassing purposes. Do not use eggs that have been washed as they spoil more easily than unwashed, clean eggs. If sufficient eggs are not obtainable when the water glass solution is first made, additional eggs may be added from time to time.

Water glass is 30 cents a quart and a quart of waterglass will preserve 15 dozen eggs. It is not desirable to use the water glass solution a second time. Eggs can be water glassed for about 2 cents a dozen. Since water glass eggs remain in excellent condition they can be used in the fall and winter when fresh eggs are selling for 60 cents or more a dozen.

Use the following method:

- 1.—Select a five-gallon crock and clean it thoroughly after which it should be scalded and allowed to dry.
- 2.—Heat a quantity of water to the boiling point and allow it to cool.
- 3.—When cool measure out nine quarts of water, place it in the crock and add the one quart of water glass and stir the mixture thoroughly.
- 4.—Place the eggs in this solution. Eggs may be added from day to day. Be very careful to allow at least two inches of the solution to cover the eggs at all times.
- 5.—Place the crock containing the preserved eggs in a cool dry place, well covered to prevent evaporation.

FARMERS NEED LIMESTONE.

There are millions of acres of sour and semi-sour soil on the farms of the United States. The U. S. Department of Agriculture, through its bulletins and county agents, recommends ground limestone as the remedy. Many farmers have made considerable money out of the high prices prevailing in war-times. Isn't it the part of wisdom and good business management to spend part of the surplus income in farm improvement? Isn't the time ripe to sweeten up some of those sour fields by application of ground limestone?

The time may be near at hand when war prices will fade away. If that transpires, undoubtedly the farmer whose fields are in the best physical condition to produce the best and largest crops at least cost will come out the winner in the race for farm trade at after-war depressed prices.

Farmers having fields that require lime to put them in highest producing condition should ponder well if this is not the logical time to give them the treatment.

SELECTION OF EGGS FOR HATCHING.

Set only good-sized eggs uniform in size.

Set only good-shaped eggs uniform in shape.

Set only good-colored eggs uniform in color.

This all you can do with a little care in selection.

It is worth while as eggs of good size, color, and shape and uniform are a marketable product at higher prices than small eggs varying in color and all shapes.

Eggs weighing less than two ounces should not be used for hatching. The large-sized egg hatches a larger chick.

This larger chick grows faster than the smaller chick.

This larger chick will be marketable as a broiler sooner.

This larger chick matures younger.

This larger chick begins laying sooner than the smaller chick.

The income is received sooner and they are more profitable.

These facts apply to all breeds. The comparisons are made between small and large chicks in the same breed. Careful selection of eggs for hatching pays. Don't neglect it.—C. A. C.

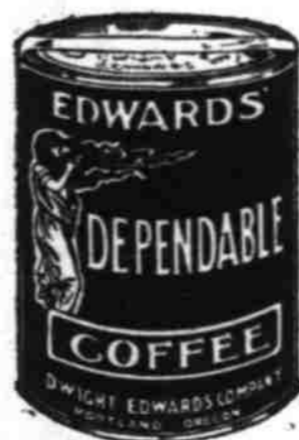
WHAT SILAGE DOES.

GARDENING AT LITTLE COST.

There is not any need for a lot of expensive tools for the cultivation of a small garden. A spade or spading fork, a hoe, and a steel rake are the essential garden tools. To these should be added two wooden stakes and a strong string to serve as a line for making straight rows. A watering can and a trowel are desirable but not necessary. Where the garden work is to be carried on rather extensively, it is a good plan to secure a combination seed drill and wheel hoe, or simply the wheel hoe alone.

EXPLOSIVES REGULATION REVOKED.

Because no longer required for the public safety the director of the U. S. Bureau of Mines, in charge of explosives regulation, has made the following changes in the general information and rulings under the act of October 6, 1917 (49 Stat. 385) and as amended by the sundry civil act of July 1, 1918:

1.—All regulations relating to the purchase, possession, and use of explosives for reclaiming of land, stump blasting, ditching, and other agricultural purposes are revoked and no further license will be required.

2.—These revocations do not al-

low enemy aliens or subjects of a country allied with an enemy of the United States to manufacture, purchase, or sell, use or possess explosives at any time.

3.—Provided, that nothing in the above shall release any person who ever from complying with the law in the matter of safeguarding and storing of explosives.
