He made a run of six in the 73rd and scored 26 points in the last 17 innings.

EUGENE, Ore., April 10.—Dudley R. Clarke, a graduate of the University of Oregon in 1910, has been made the recipient of the Cheva Liere of the crown of Italy for gallant

service with an ambulance company on the Italian front, according to a letter received by Mrs. Emma Wootton Hall, secretary of military affairs at the university. Clarke was prominent in athletics while at the university, and was picked for the all northwest football team in his senior year.

Stanford Schedule Is to Include Portland

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., April 10.—A partial American football schedule calling for games with California and Oregon teams, was announced by the graduate manager of Stanford University today.

No game has been scheduled with the University of California. It cannot be determined at this time if Stanford will meet the state university, the graduate manager announced.

October 21 Stanford will meet the Oregon Agricultural college at Portland; November 1, St. Mary's at Stanford; 8th, Santa Clara at Stanford; 22nd, Oregon University at Stanford; 27th, University of Southern California at Pasadena.

Shy Huntington Made Coach for Next Year

EUGENE, April 10.—Charles (Shy) Huntington, football coach at the University of Oregon last year, was today chosen by the athletic council to fill the same position this year. Mr. Huntington was a graduate of the university in 1918 and made a nation-wide reputation as a grid iron star as quarterback of the University of Oregon team of 1916 that defeated U. of Pennsylvania at Pasadena, Cal., on New Years day, 1917. Coach Huntington's team won the northwest championship last fall.

Joie Ray Establishes New Indoor Record

CHICAGO, April 10.—Joie Ray, national A. A. U. mile champion, established a new world's indoor record of 4:14 3-5 for the mile tonight in the Central A. A. U. championship being held under the auspices of the Franklin A. C. The old mark was 4:16. Ray is the Illinois Athletic club's phenomenal miler.

Jo Loomis, best known as a sprinter, representing the Chicago Athletic association, took the high jump by clearing the bar at six feet.

PASSION WEEK PROGRAM READY

Ministers' Association Arranges Series of Meetings at Theater

The officers are directed to refuse to entertain any propaganda from any sources urging such a proposed strike.

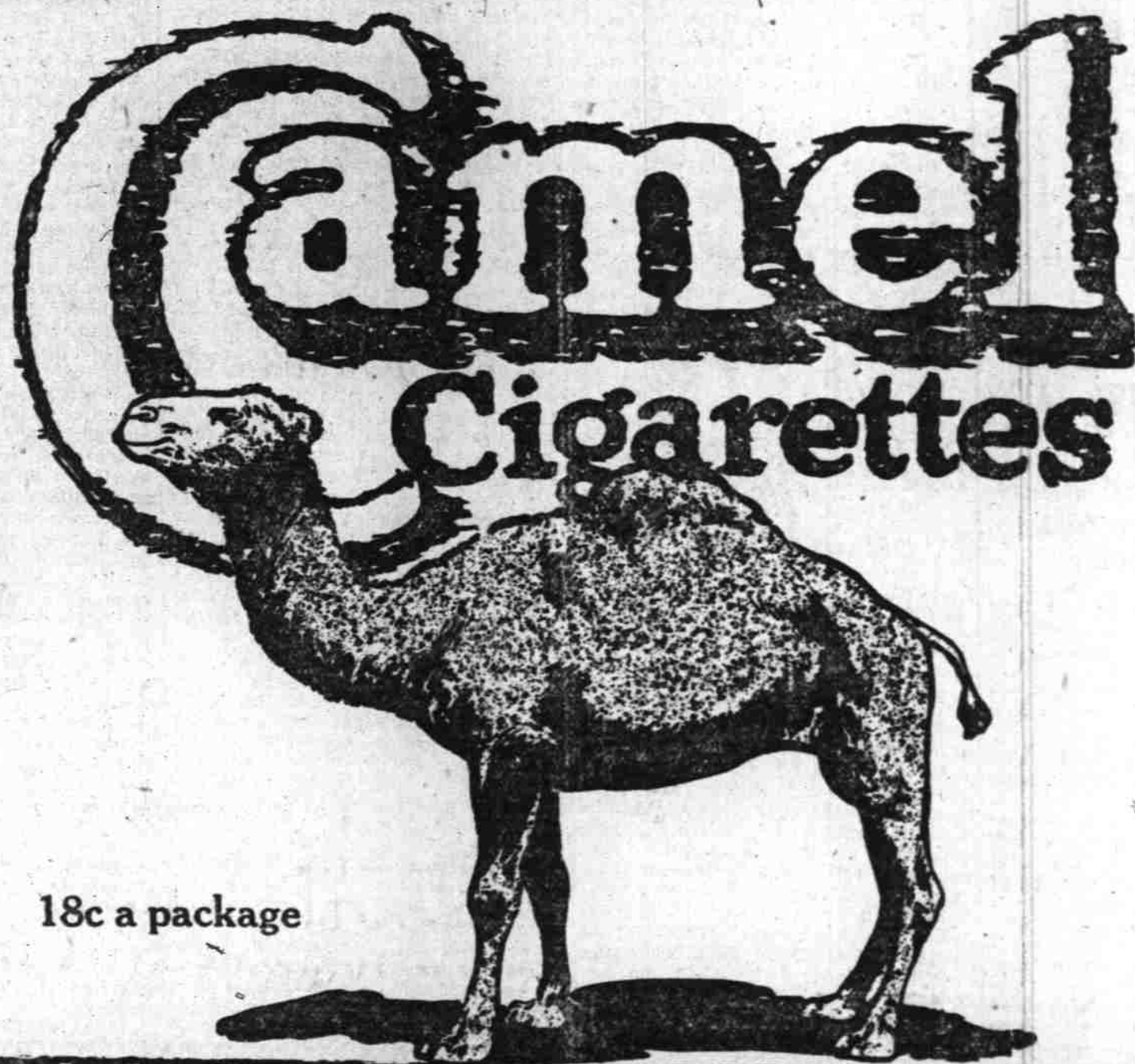
