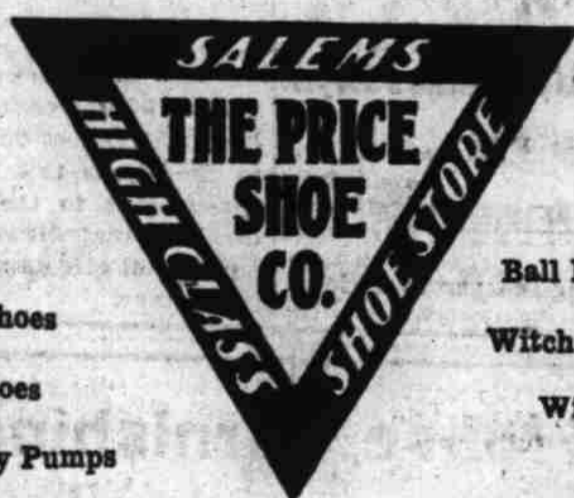

Harry G. Hawker in Readiness to Leave St. Johns, N. F. for Irish Coast

SHIPS ASKED TO ASSIST

Airman Seeks to Be Pioneer and Win Daily Mail \$50,000 Prize

ST. JOHNS, N. F., April 12.—A southeaster blowing half a gale across Mount Pearl plateau just before daylight today prevented the attempt of Harry G. Hawker, plucky British airman, to realize his ambition of being first to fly across the Atlantic, thereby winning not only fame but the \$50,000 prize of the London Daily Mail.

Hawker refused tonight to discuss the delay or to indicate when he hoped to start, although it had been announced earlier that he would try to get away tomorrow.

All shipping in the North Atlantic was notified today to be on the lookout to render aid to the fliers. A wireless message sent broadcast by the naval authorities which are co-operating in the flight read:

"Trans-Atlantic flights to be attempted within the next three days. Any ships sighting airplanes to transmit her position three times at a speed of eight words per minute, without being asked by the machine. Also to give true direction and force of wind."

PORTLAND, Ore., April 12.—The Oregon Agricultural College track squad won the fifteenth annual Northwest indoor track and field meet here today, scoring 52 1-3.

The Multnomah Amateur Athletic club team lost out by only four points, scoring 48 1-3. The open relay was the final and deciding event of the meet. When first call was issued for the relay Multnomah club was in the lead, 48 1-3 points to the Aggies 47 1-3. By winning the relay, the Aggies took the meet. The University of Oregon took third place, scoring 22 1-3 points.

HELPS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE.

An Egg Substitute.—Popular Science Monthly recommends carrots as an excellent substitute for eggs in making puddings and the like. Here is the recipe:

Boil the carrots until they are tender and nearly ready to fall apart; drain carefully, and mash and press through a coarse cloth or strainer. The pulp is then introduced among the other ingredients of the pudding and the egg totally omitted. Puddings made in this manner are lighter than where eggs are used, and are more palatable. The carrots also impart a fine yellow color to the pudding.
