

CHURCH NEWS

Today will be a day of music and the churches of Salem will rebound from early morning until late into the evening with the sound of glad some anthems and classic chants.

Whether it be in Sunday school program, choral measure or dignified sermon the predominant theme in today's devotions will be the resurrection of Christ. Since Monday Passion week services have been held in many of the churches and for the first time in one of the downtown theaters, where each day vocal solos and sermons by members of the Ministerial association have been features. The union gathering at noon has been well attended by business men and women and pastors are more than satisfied with the results.

Many new members will be added into the houses of worship and baptisms are in order. Numerous elaborate cantatas, oratorios and sacred concerts have been announced. Outstanding among these is "The Holy City" by A. R. Gaul, which is to be presented by the choir of the First Methodist church at 8 p. m. Miss Margaret Wible, A. A. Schramm, Paul Sterling and Miss Venita McKinney carry the solo parts in the oratorio, which is to be under the direction of Professor John R. Sites. Leslie Methodist church is to have a cantata, "The Gates Ajar," participated in by a chorus of 30 girls.

At the Scandinavian Lutheran church the Sunday school will give an evening program. At the Central Congregational "The Dawn of a Wonderful Day" is to be the junior feature at the regular morning services. Jason Lee Memorial and the First Presbyterian also have programs by the Sunday schools. The latter will

hold special vespers at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sunrise prayer meetings will be held by the Jason Lee, Court Street Christian, Central and First Congregational churches.
