TRADING TAKES ON BROAD SCOPE
Big Advances Made in Corn After Recent Jump in Hog Values

CHICAGO, April 23.—Big advances in the corn market today with trading on a broad scale resulted to a great extent from a jump in the value of hogs to the highest price ever known, \$21.15 a hundred-weight. The close in corn was at the topmost point reached, a net gain of three cents to 5 1/2 a bushel, with July \$1.62 1/2 to \$1.62 3/4 and September \$1.59 1/4 to \$1.59 3/4. Oats finished 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 up, and provisions showing a rise of 1/2 to 1 1/2.

All deliveries of corn quickly went above any previous quotations this season, and despite heavy profit taking sales kept on the upgrade almost unchecked throughout the day. It was pointed out that the market value of hogs represents corn in the final stage, and that the feeding cost was the most generally accepted test of what price should be paid for the grain. Strained political conditions in Europe tended further to strengthen bullish sentiment and so too did crop movement.

Oats were hoisted by the same forces that governed corn. May, laid jumped to \$31.0 per cwt., a new tip top.

METAL SHARES POPULAR CHOICE
Confident Buying of Rails Outstanding Feature in New York

NEW YORK, April 23.—Factors which contributed measurably to the strength and activity of today's market, notably the confident buying of rails were operative again today reinforced by a keen inquiry for other popular shares, particularly steels.

Confident buying of rails was the central feature, asserting its former leadership on an enormous turnover

at an extreme gain of 2 1/2 points to 103, though yielding all but a large fraction in the extensive profit taking of the last hour.

Buying of steel credited largely to powerful financial interests was the more interesting in view of next week's meeting of the directors to act on the dividend and because of the uncertain state of that industry as a whole.

Affiliated shares joined in the advance at gross gains of one to four points, but these too, were relinquished for the most part at the close.

The rise in rails was again restricted mainly to low grade issues of the western and southwestern sections, investment shares such as transcontinental, Reading and Eastern trunk lines at no time making more than slight gains.

Aside from Royal Dutch Oil, oils were uncertain in the shipping and motors and their accessories, but metals were usually active and strong. International nickel being the only noteworthy exception.

Sales amounted to 1,700,000 shares, which sets a high water mark for the year to date.

Bonds including liberty issues were firm but featureless. Total sales par value, aggregated \$11,875,000. Old United States registered four rose 1/4 per cent on sales.

Man of Mystery Is Identified by Message
PORTLAND, Ore., April 23.—R. J. Darby, who was shot last Saturday while in the woods in a Portland suburb, dying the next day, was identified today as R. J. Davis, of Mystic, Conn., by means of a telegraphic description which tallied with the dead man. Darby had left with his landlady a note to Mr. Davis to be delivered only in the event of his death. He had asked that the police be not acquainted with the note or its address but after his death the police got in touch with the Connecticut address and identification followed. Darby said, just before his death, that he had met his assailant whom he described as a real estate dealer giving the name of Coy, at the Portland Y. M. C. A., and that he had been taken to the suburbs to look at some property when Coy fired on him and shot him twice.
