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rest them if there is evidence that they were responsible for manufacturing the infernal machines and placing them in the mails.

These agencies will cooperate with the postal inspectors in running down the criminals, placing at the disposal of postal authorities all evidence gathered in past months which might shed light on the bomb outrages.

GADSDEN, Ala., April 30.—Representative John L. Burnett, chairman of the immigration committee of the last house, narrowly escaped serious injury or possibly death today by an infernal machine received through the mails. The lid on the package stuck when Mr. Burnett attempted to open it, arousing his suspicions and he turned the machine over to the police.

The package was marked "Gimble Brothers, New York," and was similar in every way to those sent other high government officials who have been connected with proposals to limit after war immigration and with prosecution of espionage law violations. The package exploded with a loud report when hit by a revolver bullet fired by the police.

It is believed by the police that Mr. Burnett's activities in the house on measures regarding the deportation of dangerous alien enemy and prohibition of immigration for a period after the war led to the attempt on his life.

While chairman of the house immigration committee, Mr. Burnett introduced bills to provide that all enemy aliens who had violated laws during the war should be deported and to stop immigration for four years after the war. When congress adjourned without passing the bills Mr. Burnett announced that he would introduce the measures again at the next session and would endeavor to pass in every way to have them passed.

It was recalled here that a similar infernal machine had been received at the home of former Senator Thomas W. Hardwick, retiring chairman of the senate immigration committee.

BOMBS DISTRIBUTED OVER ENTIRE NATION

A slip on the part of the senders of the infernal machines coupled with the sharp wits of a postoffice clerk were all that prevented the bombs from being delivered. The sixteen packages were mailed Saturday night in a box somewhere in the neighborhood of 30th Street and Broadway. They had the correct postage for the parcel post but were sealed with red wafers and therefore it was believed accepted only as first class matter. Accordingly, they were sent to the general postoffice to be referred back to the sender.

Postal Clerk Gets Tip.
Each parcel had the name of Gimble Brothers printed on it and the department store was notified but failed to answer. Early this morning Charles Kaplan, a postoffice clerk, while on his way home from work, read in a morning paper of the bomb sent to Senator Hardwick of Georgia. The description of the package containing the bomb struck him and he hurried back to the postoffice and examined the detained parcels. He then notified the superintendent of his suspicions and the packages were sent to Chief Postoffice Inspector W. E. Cochran. Explosives experts were called in by Inspector Cochran and one of the parcels was opened. It contained a small phial fastened to the top of a polished basswood cylinder in such a manner that the cylinder could not be opened without breaking the bottle. The breaking of the bottle would release a chemical which in turn would ignite three fulminate

of mercury caps resting on a stick of dynamite. The whole bomb showed evidences of skilled workmanship.

Store Is Cleared.
Later in the day a representative of Gimble Brothers called on Inspector Cochran and after examining the parcels declared the wrappings had never originated in the department store. He pointed out that the outside covering was of highly glazed, expensive type of paper, such as would not be used by any department store for mere wrapping purposes. The inner box containing the wooden cylinder was also made of a very fine grade of green cardboard, unlike any in ordinary use. Each of the parcels measured eight inches in length, two in depth and two in width.

On the back of each parcel was stamped in red: "Novelties—A Sample." Inspector Cochran expressed the belief that this was an effort on the part of the senders to induce the secretary of an intended victim to hand the parcel unopened to his chief. The officials who are in charge of the investigation believe that the very elaborateness of the would-be assassins may prove their undoing as affording certain clues to their identity.

Everybody is awaiting the effect the vote will have on the attitude of President Wilson and the allied powers and hope is generally expressed that the peace conference will see the necessity of satisfying the Italian claims, thus avoiding a complete rupture which, it is pointed out in certain quarters, might lead to graver consequences.

The Popolo Romano sums up this idea, saying: "The world is now confronted with the following dilemma: either the five great powers must agree on the Italian question or Italy will be obligated to act independently of the others."

The Italian newspapers are less vehement in their attacks on President Wilson though the Tempo speaks of "President Wilson's obstinate savagery."

MRS. B. H. WHITE SEEKS DIVORCE

Personal Cruelty and Threats Against Lives Are Alleged in Suit

Edith Eyre White filed suit for divorce yesterday against B. H. White, alleging personal cruelty and threats against her life. She also filed a separate suit to recover a half interest in certain properties, including the home of the couple, which she alleges her husband contrived to obtain.

Mrs. White charges a number of cases of threatened and actual bodily harm during a period of illness and alleges among other things that her husband threatened to dynamite the house and bring the "flu" home to the family. She claims that he handled guns around the house and made threats against the lives of herself, father and brother.

She charges that in September, 1918, the defendant attempted to get her to turn over to him certain personal property and bonds in order that he might appear before the legal advisory board as supporting the family. She states that she informed him that such action would constitute a penitentiary offense and that he replied he would rather go to the penitentiary for a year than serve as private in the army.

Mrs. White claims that the trouble culminated April 29 when her husband grabbed her and after pulling her inside the house, locked the door and pushed her upon a bed and made her stay there. She alleges that the city marshal was called and when she was released she went home to her father. She claims that she has been in a critical physical condition as result of alleged acts.

She asks custody of the two children of the couple and a motion was filed for an order to restrain the defendant from removing the children from the jurisdiction of the circuit court.

The couple was married in Salem October 31, 1906.

In her suit involving the property, Mrs. White alleges that Mr. White bought property in South Dakota for \$5000 and Idaho for \$3000 with her money and that she paid for the residence property and built their home with the understanding that the deeds were to be in her name. She charges that the deeds were made

out through her husband's efforts, in the name of both of them and asks that he deed to her his half interest in the properties.

Chinese Woman Released on Own Recognizance to Care for Children

Mrs. Hing is accused of having threatened the lives of her own children and of a neighbor family. She put up a frenzied fight with the officers at the time of her arrest and for several days Chinatown was disturbed by prospects of tong trouble as result of her actions.

Removal from District Loses Director His Job

When a school director removes from the district in which he is incumbent his office is vacated immediately and the county school superintendent, under section 173 of the school laws, is authorized to declare a vacancy in the board of directors. This is the reply of Attorney General Brown to an inquiry by J. J. Churchill, state superintendent of schools. Mr. Churchill was in doubt as to whether the director would continue to hold his right of residence for a period of 30 days.

Transfer of Peninsula to Be Made Without Reserve

PARIS, April 30.—The agreement regarding the Shantung peninsula

and Kiao-Chau, which has been reached between the council of three and the Japanese delegates provides for their transfer without reserve to Japan, which voluntarily engages to hand the Shantung peninsula back to China.

PIPES' BRIEF FOR OLCOTT

Portland Lawyer Aers That Office of Governor Is Held Without Question

Holding that Ben Olcott is successor of the late Governor Withycombe as actual governor of Oregon with all the powers and duties of the office and that she should, under the constitution, fill the whole of Governor Withycombe's unexpired term, Judge Martin L. Pipes, yesterday filed a brief with the supreme court in the case of Olcott vs. Hoff, Judge Pipes avers that the question is properly before the court in a mandamus proceeding relative to salary, but that the right to office comes as an incidental question which necessarily will have to be decided to determine the salary question.

One paragraph in the brief reads: "It was never intended that Oregon should ever be, and she never has been without a governor, charged with all duties, clothed with all powers, entitled to all emoluments, and endowed with all the dignity of the office of governor, including the official name and title thereof. In other words the section provides for succession, instantaneous, and by operation of law. It admits of no interval, suffers no delay, requires no ceremony, awaits no consent, demands no action. When the governor dies, the governor lives. Political power and function comprising the office are to be continuous, uninterrupted and perpetual."

Judge Pipes sets out argument to

show that the pronoun "same" in the applying portion of the state constitution which says the "same shall devolve upon the secretary of state" refers to "office" and not to "duties."

Relative to a contention of the opposing briefs that a mandamus is not the proper remedy because it involves the trial of right to the office Judge Pipes says it is true that the title to the office is incidentally involved, but that there is no other claimant to the office and the object is not a controversy over the office between Mr. Olcott and some other person.
