**Belgians Want to Be  
Released from Loans**

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The Belgian official information service, in a statement tonight based on official advice from Brussels said that the associated governments were endeavoring to complete some arrangement whereby Belgium would be released from liability for loans contracted during the war. The statement also said that plenipotentiaries from Belgium, England, France and Holland would meet soon to consider another agreement which would replace the treaty of 1839, and guarantee additional military security to Belgium.

**U. S. Navy Plane and Crew That Will Try to Fly Across the Atlantic**

Uncle Sam's navy fliers do not seem to be worrying much about their English rivals who have been waiting in New Foundland for several weeks to try the "big hop" over the Atlantic. It has been announced at the Rockaway (N. Y.) Naval air station that three planes will go to New Foundland. They probably will be the NC-2 and NC-3, and the latter is expected to be the first to start across the ocean. This photograph shows the NC-3 after it had completed a trial flight, during which three different types of propellers were tried out. Below are the six men who will compose the crew on the flight to New Foundland. They are: commanding officer, Lieutenant-Commander P. N. L. Bellinger; pilots, Lieutenant Commander M. A. Mitcher and Lieutenant L. T. Barin; radio operator, Lieutenant H. Sadenwater; engineer, Chief Machinist's Mate C. I. Kesler; machinist, R. Christensen. Christensen will be dropped at New Foundland and the NC-3 will start the transatlantic flight with a crew of five.

**MAYOR HANSEN  
NOT TO RESIGN**

Stories Printed in Paper Denied by Seattle's Executive Now on Tour

CLEVELAND, May 6.—Mayor Ole Hansen, of Seattle "Wash." speaking here today on his tour of the country in the interest of the victory loan, issued a statement denying the country published throughout the country quoting him as saying he was going to resign as mayor Seattle, to take the law in his own hands and advocate public hangings of the I. W. W.'s and anarchists.

Mayor Hansen's statement follows: "Certain stories are being printed in the press quoting me as saying that I would resign as mayor of Seattle and take the law in my own hands and advocate public hangings of the I. W. W.'s. Every such statement published is absolutely untrue in substance and in fact. I have never advocated lawless acts by any one at any time. I desire this denial to be as sweeping as possible."

**North Sweden Has Worst Floods in Many Seasons**  
 STOCKHOLM, May 6.—(By The Associated Press)—North Sweden is experiencing the worst floods in many years, due to abnormal rains and snow falls. The damages are estimated at more than 30,000,000 krona.  
 There have been avalanches and landslides in the Tromsø district. Three farms were swept into the sea, 12 persons meeting death. Two cities, Sollefteå and Heröland and several villages are isolated. Enormous masses of lumber are on the crest of the flood, increasing the damage.

**Greeks Want No Cruel  
Treatment from Italy**

SALONIKI, May 6.—Greeks from Strumitza who have taken refuge here have addressed a note to President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain and M. Venizelos, the Greek prime minister, begging them not to permit Italy, which has occupied Strumitza, to follow the example of the Bulgarians to perpetrate cruelties against the Greeks there.

**TWO FINNS ARE  
FOUND GUILTY**

Editor and Business Manager of Toveri Convicted in District Court

PORTLAND, Or., May 6.—W. R. Reivo, editor, and A. J. Partan, business manager of the Toveri, a Finnish newspaper published in Astoria by the Western Workmen Publishing company, were found guilty here today by a jury in the United States district court of violating the espionage act, the specific charge being the distribution of seditious literature.

The maximum penalty which may be inflicted on each of the two men is 20 years in prison and a fine of \$10,000. Attorney Tom Mannix representing the two convicted men, served notice that he would move for a new trial and Judge Wolverton granted him 30 days in which to file his motion.

Judge Wolverton permitted the bail of \$1,000 to stand after receiving assurance from the men they would conduct themselves properly while at liberty and that they would not publish anything derogatory to the government.  
 The conviction of the two men, according to Deputy United States Attorney Goldstein, is not a slap at the lawabiding element of Finns in Astoria, many of whom have supported the government staunchly during the war, but against a small radical element of individuals who are against the government and war and who have been distributing literature intended to discourage support of the Finnish element during the war.

According to instructions issued yesterday by Judge Wolverton the jury returned a verdict of not guilty against Franz Neimi, president and J. Kuivala, secretary of the Western Workmen's publishing company, who were tried jointly with the editor and business manager on the same charges.

**Great Britain Recognizes  
Independence of Finland**

LONDON, May 6.—The British government has recognized the independence of Finland and the de facto government, according to an announcement by Cecil Harmsworth, parliamentary secretary for foreign affairs in the house of commons today. The announcement was greeted with cheers.

The council of foreign ministers at Paris yesterday decided that recognition would be extended to the government of Finland under certain conditions which were not disclosed.

**Parks of California to  
Be Patrolled by Planes**

SACRAMENTO, May 6.—Acting on orders from Washington, Adjutant T. S. Voss of Mather Field, is making arrangements for the daily patrol by airplane of the national parks and forests of northern California. He announced tonight the service will begin June 1, and that two or three machines will be in daily use, a radius of 150 miles being covered. When a fire is located the aviator will fly to the nearest station or settlement, and drop a small parachute containing a message giving needed information to the forestry forces.

**GOVERNMENT TO  
SELL 12 CAMPS**

Price Over \$548,000—Bid of Wrecking Company Turned Down by Department

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Approval on the sale of 12 army camps, eight national guard concentration sites and four small miscellaneous camps—for a total of more than \$548,000 was announced today by Acting Secretary of War Crowell.  
 War department officials showed satisfaction over the results, the material covered by the sale consisting almost exclusively of hastily constructed buildings and some stored equipment. The govern-

ment reserved for its own use the base hospitals and storage warehouses.  
 Forty-four bids were received from 35 individuals and corporations, the largest single proposal being from one large wrecking company which offered to take all the camps for a price approximating \$540,000. This proposal was rejected largely because of the desire of the department to turn over to cities adjacent to training camps, the sanitary and other facilities which could be used advantageously for the benefit of their populations.

**New Rate on Fuel Will  
Destroy Trade in Wood**

Protesting that its fuel wood business will be ruined if a freight rate increase of 150 per cent is allowed to prevail, the Grande Ronde Lumber company has telegraphed a protest to the Oregon public service commission, and the commission is petitioned to make an effort to have the order of the railroad administration altered. The commission will act.

The new tariff was effective May 1, and applies to shipments between intrastate points. On chain wood, or wood obtained from the cuttings of lumber mills, the former rate allowed the company between Perry and LaGrande was 50 cents for 150 cubic feet. The new charge is 90 cents for 128 cubic feet. Considering the difference in amount of wood on which the rate is based the new charge adds 25 cents. The company has been selling wood in LaGrande at \$3 delivered, but declares the new rate, if allowed, will make it necessary to discontinue shipping wood to LaGrande and destroy the company's wood trade.

**Hamilton, "Hun Hunter,"  
May Give Lecture Here**

Major Jack Hamilton, the "Hun hunter," is in Salem and may make arrangements to give a lecture here in a short time. Major Hamilton is one of the men with whom truth is stranger than fiction. He it was who rescued a French convent girl from invading Huns and the young woman is now Madame Hamilton. He tells the story in his lecture.  
 Major Hamilton was in the war from the start and claims to be the first American to go to battle against the Germans. He was in the big world row on August 14, 1914, the day France declared war, and before he quit served in the French, British and American armies.  
 His lectures are given for the benefit of the orphan children of France and the Armenian sufferers. He toured the state with Louis J. Simpson in the interests of the liberty loan and has spoken 64 times in Portland.

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**HOOPER MEETS GERMANS**

LONDON, May 6.—Herbert Hoover, head of the inter-allied food commission, had his first direct discussion with the German delegates at Versailles yesterday, according to a dispatch from Berlin.
