CONVENTION TO ATTRACT MANY Arrangements Made to Accommodate Large Sunday School Delegation

Salem will be well represented at the Oregon State Sunday School convention, which opens Thursday at Corvallis. A large delegation from the county is expected and a committee is at work arranging automobile transportation for those who desire to go. The conference will last through Sunday. Among those from this city who are on the program are Dr. Frank E. Brown, vice-president of the state association, Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette university, and the entire university glee club. Divisional conferences are to be

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held each morning for the leaders of the old and young people. A number of prominent speakers are scheduled for addresses, among them Professor Houlton of Dayton, Ohio, who is an educational superintendent of the International Sunday School association, Professor A. M. Locker of Chicago, organization superintendent of the same association, and Rev. John H. Matthews of Seattle, R. Harold H. Griffin and Rev. Har Humbert of Portland are two of speakers on the program who took part in the recent county convention in Salem.

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
