## New Firm Puzzled—

Before launching the organization of an inter-insurance exchange for the purpose of exchanging indemnities on automobiles, certain Portland persons have inquired of State Insurance Commissioner Harvey Wells relative to the law which requires liabilities of \$1,500,000 before a license can be issued. The question asked is how to arrive at the amount of liability, whether it includes all coverage or only the value of the machine insured. All coverage is represented by fire, theft or embezzlement, collision, property damage and personal liability. The attorney general holds that each of the liabilities insured may be added to the amount of insurance represented by the total insured value of the car in arriving at the aggregate value and each amount considered separate risk.

## Decision in Telephone Suit Favors Defendants

The suit of Floyd Davenport and others against J. G. Van Arman and others all of whom were stockholders in a mutual telephone company in the north end of the county, has been decided in favor of the defendants by a decree given in circuit court by Judge Bingham.

The suit was brought by part of the stockholders alleging that the others had several connections of the company with the Marquam switch board and had connected with the Interurban Telephone company of Silverton to the detriment of the plaintiffs. According to the findings in the case the disconnection was made following a majority vote of the stockholders and the plaintiffs were benefitted by connection with the Silverton company while the defendants were injured by the disconnection with Marquam. It is ordered that property be sold and the defendants paid \$10 each for their damages, and the remainder be distributed to plaintiffs and defendants.

OLCOTT CASE  
NOT DECIDEDOpinion from Supreme Court  
on Governorship Is Expected in Week

State officials and others about the capitol building were on the quiver Tuesday in expectancy that the supreme court would hand down an opinion in the action of Ben W. Olcott against State Treasurer O. P. Hoff, a mandamus proceeding instituted to determine Mr. Olcott's status as governor and disappointment was keen when the opinion failed to appear in the usual Tuesday morning grist of decisions. There appears to be little doubt, however, that an opinion will come down next Thursday. Relief in state circles is general that the supreme court justice to whom the case was assigned has written his opinion, and that the only reason why it did not reach the public yesterday is that other justices, governed by opposing convictions in the case, have not made up their minds relative to writing special concurring opinions and dissenting opinions, depending on the positions they have taken. It is generally believed there will be a dissenting opinion or two regardless of which way the decision goes.

Opinions handed down by court, none of which was of wide importance, follow:  
Earl Tucker, appellant, vs. W. H. Nuding, appeal from Jackson county; suit to enjoin defendant from closing a roadway; from premises of plaintiff across defendant land to a public highway. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge F. M. Calkins reversed.

Ukase Investment company vs. Walter V. Smith, et al, appellants; appeal from Multnomah county. Suit to foreclose a mortgage. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge J. P. Kavanaugh affirmed.

Rugh Realty company, appellants, vs. Ole Soleim; appeal from Lane county. Suit for commission alleged due for transfer of property. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge G. F. Skippworth affirmed.

F. J. Martin vs. T. Moreland et al, appellants; appeal from Multnomah county. Action for damages. Opinion by Justice Benson. Judge E. V. Littlefield reversed and case remanded for further proceedings.

J. C. Schultz vs. B. L. Walzel, appellant; petition for rehearing on motion to dismiss denied per curiam.

L. G. Farman, appellant, vs. Mary M. Farman; appeal from Wheeler county. Motion to dismiss appeal overruled per curiam.

Cases of David Auld et al. vs. J. F. Spores, et al, appellants, and of Mary Braugher, appellant, vs. East Side Mill and Lumber company, dismissed by stipulation.

lem will act as advisory board for the State Industrial School for Girls, according to an announcement made yesterday by Governor Olcott. Mrs. Baldwin, who has been engaged in war work, is returning to Oregon and will resume her place on the board. During her absence Mrs. George McMath of Portland acted as member of the board, the appointment being made with the understanding, however, that as soon as Mrs. Baldwin returned she would relinquish the place to Mrs. Baldwin.

Mrs. Castner takes the place left vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Aristene Felts. The resignation of Mrs. Felts states that she expects she will be permanently out of the

state and consequently unable to serve longer as a member of the board. Mrs. Dancy has been serving on the board for some years. All the members serve at the pleasure of the governor. Duties of the board constitute visits to the school as often as they deem it advisable and the submission of a report in writing from time to time with suggestions and recommendations as may appear for the best interest of the institution and the welfare of its inmates.
