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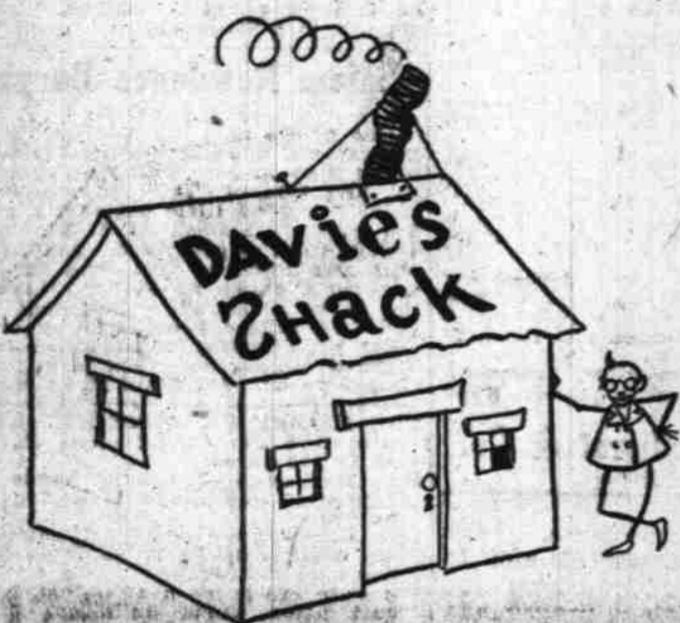

GERLINGER IS MADE APPOINTEE

Dallas Lumberman Is Given Place on Oregon State Board of Forestry

Filling a vacancy caused by the resignation of L. S. Hill of Cottage Grove, Governor Olcott yesterday appointed George T. Gerlinger of the Willamette Valley Lumber company at Dallas as a member of the state board of forestry. Mr. Hill's resignation was for the reason that he is to be out of the state during the greater part of the summer. Leading members of the West Coast Lumbermen's association which under the law would have recommended the successor of Mr. Hill. For many years Mr. Gerlinger has been active in the lumber industry of the northwest and is regarded as familiar with problems that confront the industry.

Spanish War Veterans Get Special Fare to This City

State Insurance Commissioner Harvey Wells, who is commander of the state organization of United Spanish War veterans, announces that the United States railroad administration has made a concession of one and one-third fare as a special rate to veterans who attend the state encampment to be held in Salem July 2, 3, and 4. This amounts to 4 cents a mile for round trip tickets to Salem. Mr. Wells first took up the question with railway officials in Portland who referred him to the office in Washington, D. C. Little difficulty was had in procuring the favor from the Washington office.
