Law Is Violated—
Automobiles carrying liquor from wet territory through dry territory to another point in wet territory are not common carriers and the persons riding in them are not passengers on common carriers. Therefore the persons are liable under the law as being unlawfully in possession of liquor in dry territory. This is the ruling of Attorney General Brown in reply to an inquiry by District Attorney G. M. Roberts of Medford. The question arose over the arrest of a man at Medford for transporting liquor by automobile from one point in California to another place

Irrigation for 1919—
The system of dividing the city into two districts which proved so satisfactory last year will be continued for the season of 1919.

The houses which bear even numbers on the streets will irrigate only on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday, and the houses which bear odd numbers on the streets irrigate only on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday. This plan will permit every house to irrigate four days out of each week.

Road Work Totals—
Road work for the month of April cost Marion county \$22,380.64 according to the records of County Clerk Boyer. The largest item of expense was \$10,933.92 for general repairs and miscellaneous. Payments to incorporated cities amounted to \$8,523.84, new tools and machinery cost \$3484.43, \$2358.92 was spent for macadamizing, \$2815.42 for traveling and \$1799.87 for paving. Patrolmen's salary totalled \$2075.66, and bridges required \$527.57. There were 15 men and 14 teams doing volunteer work.
