Irrigation for 1919—

The system of dividing the city into two districts which proved so satisfactory last year will be continued for the season of 1919.

The houses which bear even numbers on the streets will irrigate only on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday, and the houses which bear odd numbers on the streets irrigate only on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday. This plan will permit every house to irrigate four days out of each week.

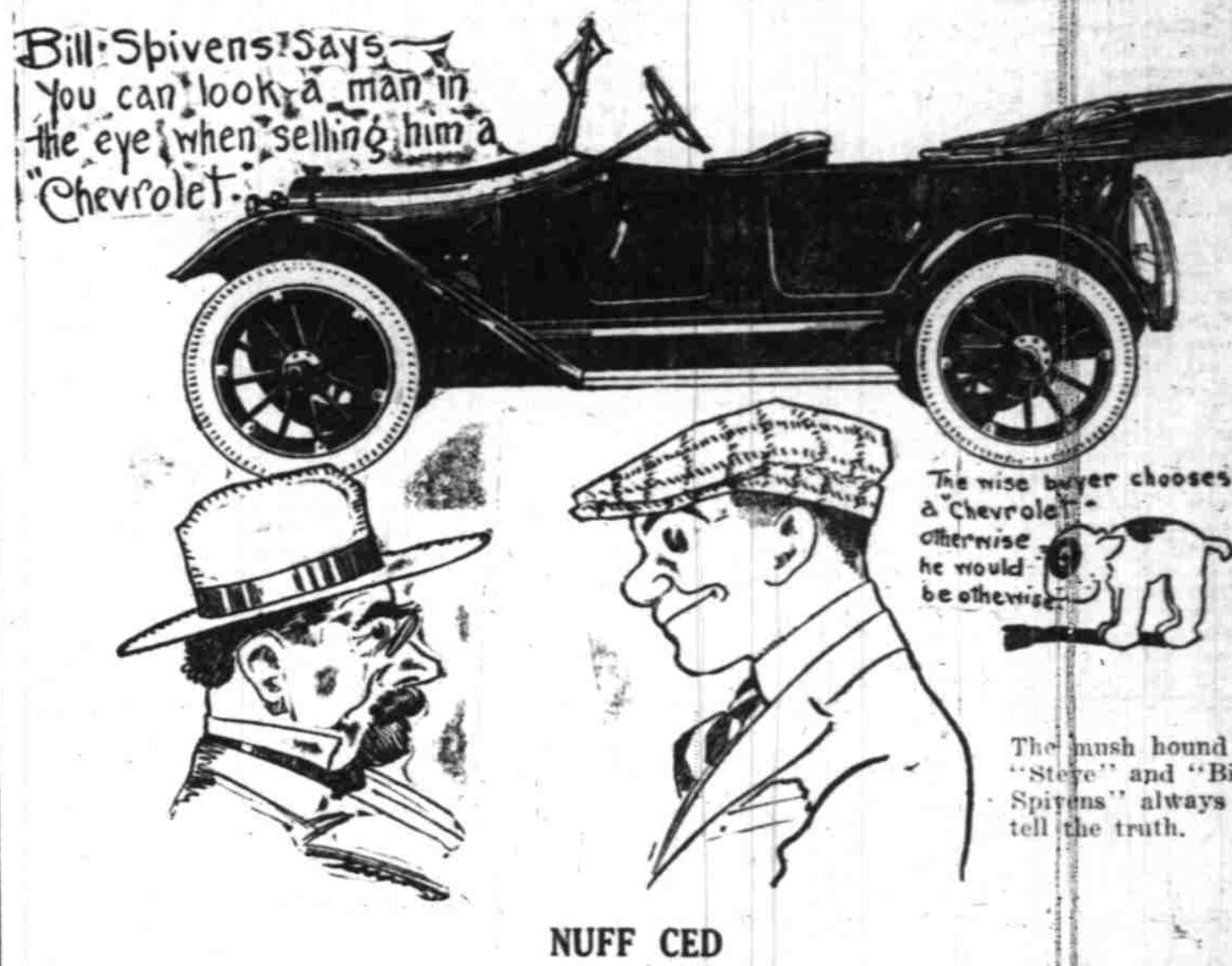
