DIFFERING RESULTS FROM
USE OF LIME.

There may be a difference of opinion among ranchers regarding the value of lime as an aid in crop production. Some may have used it and found great benefit to the crop, while others may have experienced no increase in yield, using the same kind of lime on the same kind of crop and the same kind of soil. In fact, adjoining ranches may find directly opposite results from the use of lime. Why all these antagonistic results and differences of opinion? Just this:

One man may lime his soil immediately before seeding. The other

may lime a few weeks before seeding.

The Rhode Island Agricultural Experiment station in Bulletin No. 121 tells of experiments in the field using complete fertilizers consisting of acid phosphate, chloride of potassium, nitrate of sodium and dried blood with lime. Grain crops showed great benefit when lime was added a few weeks before seeding. No benefit was shown when lime was added immediately before seeding. In fact, in some cases the crop was actually damaged by the addition of lime just before seeding.

Equilibrium must be established between the soil salts or plant food before the good effect of the lime is left. This requires a few weeks' time. Lime, through soil warmth and contact with soil solution, renders the plant foods available. It makes a soil alkaline and promotes nitrification by soil bacteria. An acid soil, or possibly one in which the lime was not added early enough before seeding, tends to stop nitrification and crop production. No apparent difference was noted in the use of either hydrated lime or ground limestone.

The Maryland station recommends the use of limestone ground so that 90 per cent of it passes through an eighty-mesh sieve. If a coarser limestone is used much more of it will be required to do the same amount of good, because it is more slowly available than the fine material.

Finally, the greatest factor for the successful use of lime seems to be not the kind nor the amount so much as the time when it is applied.
