ANOTHER Memorial day has gone and this time we honored a vastly increased number of heroes, both dead and living. The hundreds of thousands of these who made the supreme sacrifice and the hundreds of thousands more who were willing to give their lives if necessary will not soon be forgotten, making doubly significant the purpose for which the day is observed.

In Musical America of May 24 there appears an interesting interview with Winifred Byrd, formerly of Salem, who has been acclaimed the greatest pianistic wonder of the age.

When a very small child Miss Byrd was deeply interested in music but after a few lessons, it was thought that the strain would injure her health and she had to give it up. But that did not keep her from dreams of music and from practicing, and so when in a few years Frances Pelton-Jones, the great harpsichord player, stopped in Salem on her tour of the country, she insisted that the girl should have training.

After much persuasion arrangements were made for her to study at the Boston Conservatory of Music under Carl Baermann. Here she remained for five or six years and then went to Carreus in Berlin. A year spent with Carreus was a wonderful experience and she had planned to return to study more with her when Carreus died.

Her first season, 1918, one recital was given at Aeolian hall, this season two recitals, and as may rightly be expected, she is expected to give three next season in addition to several concertos. These she is preparing during the summer months.

Winifred Byrd's playing is full of vitality, imaginative and colorful. Because of the diminutive size of her hand many people have doubted that she could reach an octave and she has found it necessary many times to demonstrate to the utter satisfaction of these disbelievers.

Too much cannot be said, when speaking of Miss Byrd, of Mrs. Marie Gould, personal representative of the young musician. She has been the counselor and personal friend of Miss Byrd throughout the years spent in study.
