**Clackamas river to develop 11,705 horsepower near Estacada.** The proposed project will cost \$1,250,000. A fall of 100 feet will be utilized and a ditch and flume 6.6 miles long and a dam 400 feet long will be built. At the same time application was filed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for the storage of 40,400 acre feet from Oak Grove creek to develop power along the Clackamas river.
