New Law Applied—Klamath drainage district is the first drainage district to apply for water for irrigation purposes under a law passed by the 1919 session of the legislature. Application was received at the office of State Engineer Cupper yesterday. It asks for an appropriation of water from the Klamath river sufficient to irrigate 20,646 acres. A main canal seven miles in length will be constructed with headgates of concrete. The cost is estimated at \$205,000. The project is 10 miles south of Klamath Falls.
