WIRE LINES TURNED OVER TO OLD OWNERS

tion of the wire properties. Mr. Koons declared if other wire companies had adopted the same policy as the Postal, it would have strangled the government in the conduct of the war.

"I do not know what was in the

mind of the president, or what facts were before him," Mr. Koons said, "at the time the properties were taken over. But the country was engaged in war and because of some facts recently come to us as the result of an investigation by a post-office inspector, the actions, in my opinion of the Postal Telegraph company alone in handling government business out of the capital city and at other places in the United States

at a crucial period which the country was passing, would have justified the taking over of these properties."

Government Avoided. Mr. Koons charged the Postal avoided government business, made no special effort to expedite it, and transferred to the Western Union large numbers of government messages filed with it for delivery at places at which it maintained offices.

Information upon which the charges were based, he said, was obtained by inspectors from the records of the company. There was no evidence, however, to show intentional delay by the Postal, he said.

In view of the changed conditions since the government took over the wires, Mr. Koons said it would be unwise to return them without protective legislation.

**AUTO DEALERS
ASKED TO JOIN**

National Association Representative in Salem to Meet With Motor Men

Problems confronting the automobile dealers of every city and state are such that national organization is absolutely necessary for adequate protection, according to Robert E. Wagner of St. Louis, field secretary of the National Automobile Dealers association who has arrived in Salem to lay before the dealers an invitation to join the national association. The organization's headquarters are in St. Louis. Representing the 27,000 dealers of the country it now has a membership of 5,000 in the 48 states. It is cooperative, organized for "protection, not profit" and its officers are nationally known men among the dealers.

Mr. Wagner calls attention of the dealers to the services now offered by the N. A. D. A. to members. They are an employment department for high class employees such as salesmen, sales managers and service managers, a war tax ruling department, a legal department, a legislative aid department, a speakers' bureau, an advisory advertising bureau, a trade information department, a highways construction department, aid of traveling local secretaries in building up local associations and handling local problems and the N. A. D. A. bulletin. In the bulletin confidential matters of importance to the trade are distributed to the members, insuring information on trade problems, of days ahead of general circulation through ordinary channels. All these services free to members.

Meeting July 28 and 29

The N. A. D. A. is composed of three sections, the Grand Western, which is divided into the Pacific Northwestern, the Pacific Southwestern, and the Rocky Mountain division. The Pacific Northwestern will meet at North Yakima July 28 and 29 for which F. W. A. Vesper, president of the association will come to the coast states. Automobile men are assured of hearing

something of interest to their trade. Perfect harmony exists between the N. A. D. A. and the manufacturer's associations, and the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce.

"Anything that affects the welfare of both," said Mr. Manger, "is looked after by both organizations, and this team work was responsible for causing the legislature at Washington to see that when they considered a matter from the manufacturer's or the dealers' standpoint alone the interests of the great automobile industry was only half considered."

"One of the things which we are supporting," he added, "is the Townsend bill, introduced into the United States senate February 13, 1919, which will appropriate during the next four years and a half \$125,000,000 for the construction of 60-foot hard surface roads. Fifty millions of this will be available during the remainder of the present year, \$75,000,000 during the year of 1920, and for each of the succeeding years, \$100,000,000."

Mr. Manger will remain in Salem for a few days to organize the local dealers and then will go south stopping at Albany, Eugene, Roseburg, and other Southern Oregon points.

**MOTORISTS HAVE
NARROW ESCAPE**

**Presence of Mind of State
Printer Lawrence Saves
Family from Tragedy**

Only by rare presence of mind on the part of State Printer Arthur W. Lawrence were he and his family saved from death Wednesday night when their machine became stalled on the Southern Pacific tracks along Twelfth street within a few feet of a fast moving switch engine.

The machine was struck by the engine but because Mr. Lawrence turned the front wheels of his machine to receive a glancing blow by the engine, the car was not badly wrecked and none of the members of his family was thrown from the machine. Mrs. Lawrence and the children suffered greatly from the nervous shock.

The accident occurred when careless youthful bicyclists approached the Lawrence machine from the wrong side of the street. In attempting to avoid an accident with the bicycle riders, Mr. Lawrence swerved his car sharply to one side and the engine became stalled just as it reached the tracks.

Seeing the switch engine approaching, and feeling certain that he could not get the engine started in time to avoid a crash, Mr. Lawrence tugged at the steering wheel and received a glancing blow from the switch engine.
