VICTORY DAY IS SET ASIDE FOR ROSE FESTIVAL

Governor Issues Proclamation Urging People to Observe Next Thursday

FOR SOLDIERS' BENEFIT

All Persons Employing Overseas Veterans Asked to Give Them Holiday

Thursday, June 12, is set aside as Victory day at the Rose Festival, under a proclamation issued yesterday by Governor Olcott. Although the governor does not designate it as a legal holiday, he calls upon the people of Oregon to observe it generally, and a special request is made that all persons employing returned soldiers and sailors grant these employees a full holiday on that occasion.

"In issuing the proclamation I also express the hope that every man who has a returned soldier in his employ will allow him to participate in the big military events of June 12," said the governor. "The day is one particularly for the men who offered their entire services to their country in the great conflict and it is

conceived to pay them some share of the tribute which is their due. May they all be there to take part in the celebration in their honor."

The governor's proclamation follows:

"Whereas, the annual Rose Festival held in Portland was for many years one of the most widely known and widely heralded of the nation's celebrations, typifying the beauty of the Pacific northwest and the glories of its climate; and

Whereas, war intervened and for a time its grim realities caused a suspension of the famous festival while the people of Oregon threw the might of their men, their money and all they held dear into the struggle for humanity's righteous cause; and

Whereas, as an added tribute to the triumph of our armies there is this year to be celebrated at Portland, Oregon, the Victory Rose Festival, significant of the fact that once more peace and prosperity is with us on every hand; and

Whereas, it is the hope and wish not only that this Victory Rose Festival far surpass any and all similar events ever held, but that as nearly as possible all of Oregon will participate to make it such an event;

Now, therefore, I, Ben W. Olcott, by virtue of the authority vested in me as governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby proclaim Thursday, June twelfth, Nineteen Hundred and Nineteen, as a day set aside for the festivities arranged for in Portland, Oregon. And I ask that Oregonians from every section of the state participate in these festivities to assist in celebrating this great Victory festival with the end that it demonstrate not only our love of the beautiful, but will be a day of rejoicing as well as for our triumph over the dangers that have but lately beset our nation and our civilization."

Portland Labor Council Cannot Pick Delegates

Governor Olcott will not recede from his position that the three members of the committee to investigate the industrial accident commission who are to represent labor shall be elected by the State Federation of Labor. He is in receipt of a resolution from the Central Labor council of Portland, signed by O. R. Hartwig, acting secretary, in which that body asked to be allowed to select the three representatives of labor.

The resolution reads: "Whereas, since the Portland Central Labor council went on record as requesting an investigation of the industrial accident commission and asked that the three representing labor be selected by this body, and

Whereas it has been announced that they are to be selected by the State Federation of Labor; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Central Labor council of Portland again request the privilege of again selecting the men to represent labor."

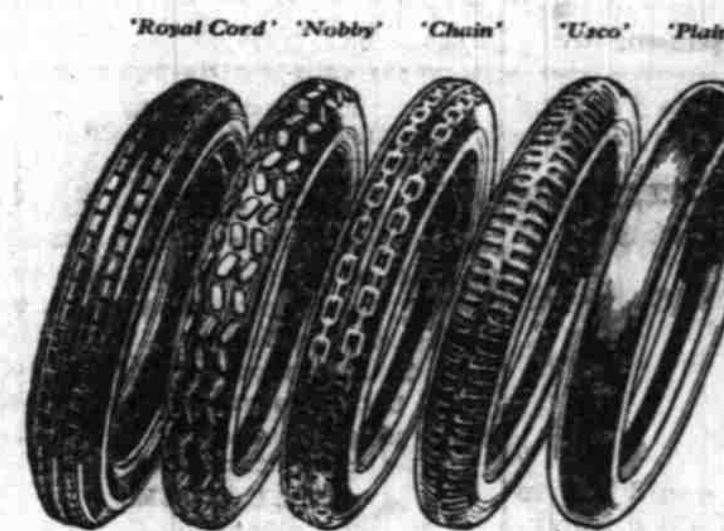

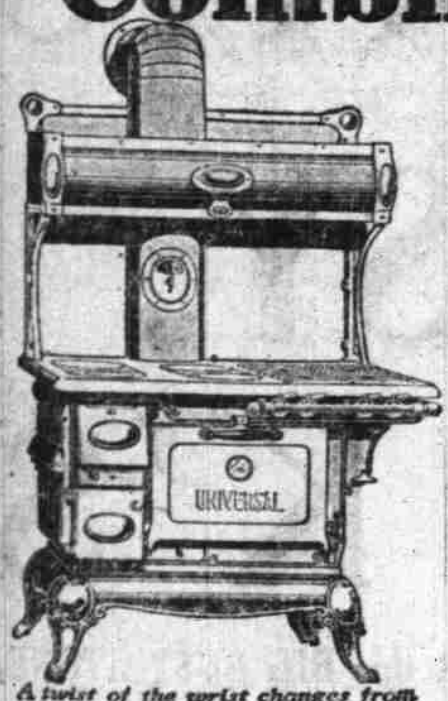
