STATE MAY YET GET BATTLESHIP SAYS GOVERNOR

Olcott Telegraphs Representative Britten Concerning Historic Boat

LEGAL ADVICE IS SOUGHT

Attorney General Brown Is Asked Concerning Use of Money to Keep Ship

Governor Olcott yesterday received the following telegram from Representative Fred A. Britten, congressman from Illinois, and member of the committee on naval affairs, who has indicated a great interest in the final disposition of the U. S. S. Oregon and to whom the governor telegraphed, recently asking the status of the battleship:

"Battleship Oregon to go out of commission because of no further military value. May be assigned by navy department to state of Oregon if state will agree to care for same without expense to the government or an act of congress will convey the ship to the state of Oregon without expense to the state if the state desires the ship as a historical relic to be maintained by the state. If you will telegraph me the state's decision I will immediately lay the matter before the committee on naval affairs now in session and the secretary of the navy for prompt favorable action."

Governor Olcott has taken the question up with Attorney General Brown as to what authority the emergency board would have to act in providing a deficiency appropriation for the naval militia, and as to whether such an appropriation could be used in connection with maintaining the historic ship. In event it is apparent the people of the state are satisfied that it is the proper procedure to maintain the ship in Oregon waters through the emergency board and in addition it develops that such board can legally provide a deficiency appropriation for the maintenance of the ship, the executive will ask for a meeting of the board to pass upon the question of granting the funds needed.

In response to Representative Britten's telegram Governor Olcott has wired as follows: "Am setting under way plans which may result in securing sufficient money to finance maintenance of Battleship Oregon in Oregon waters. Will advise you soon as possible with what success. Could you let me know approximate yearly expense maintenance in event ship conveyed to state as historical relic to be maintained by state?"

ONE-ARMED MEN WIN BALL GAME

Rooters Cheer Wounded Heroes of European Battlefields Who Appear in Big Field Meet at Fort Des Moines

DES MOINES, Ia., June 6.—Wounded heroes of European battlefields, some of them with only one leg or one arm and a few without any legs, today played baseball, ran races and took part in other novel events of a track and field meet at Fort Des Moines, which is said to be the first athletic carnival ever held exclusively for wounded soldiers. When a downpour of rain broke up the baseball game between the one-legged men and the one-armed

baseball game, which the one-armed men won, 2 to 1, in three innings rain stopping the contest. The one-legged men got off to an early lead by some reckless base running in the first inning, the opposition apparently expecting them to hug the bases. The first man up knocked out a clean single and then stole second and third and came home when the one-armed pitcher made a wild throw.

The one-armed men tied the score in the next inning, however, when the men with amputations found fast fielding difficult and won in the third on a succession of safe hits. Because of the fear of injuring some of the patients, an indoor baseball was used.

The individual star of the day was D. R. McGiboney, of Springfield, Mo., who lost a leg in the first division's offensive in the Argonne. He won the 30-yard hop for one-legged men, and with Ted Basiss, of Danville, Ill., was second in the two-legged race for two men, each man having one amputation. He hopped the 30 yards in 6 1/2 seconds.

B. L. Mead of Pittsburgh, Kas., won the manual of arms drill, which required more than thirty minutes so efficient in rifle work were the men who had had amputations.

A potato race for one-legged men, a tug-of-war for shell shock patients, a 50-yard dash for one-armed men, a cage ball game, a wheel chair race for men with no legs and a baseball throwing contest for men who had lost their natural throwing arm, were other events.

A greased pole climb, shot put and wrestling match between one-legged men had to be called off because of the rain.

POLK IS STRONG FOR ROAD BONDS

Hard Surfaced Highway Between Salem and Dallas Now Assured

DALLAS, Or., June 5.—(Special to The Statesman)—Complete returns from 35 of the 41 precincts in Polk county shows that the \$265,000 road bonding measure passed in Tuesday's election by a five to one vote. The passage of the measure assured the people of both Dallas and Salem of the construction of the hard surfaced highway between the two cities within the coming year. It is understood in Dallas that the contract for the construction of the road will be let by the state highway commission on the 10th of this month, thus giving the contractors an opportunity to build at least half of the distance this year. Should the contract be split up into more than one job it is possible that the entire distance could be built before the winter weather sets in, as the survey has already been made and everything is in readiness for grading.
