ON his way back to Changsha, China, where he has been engaged in missionary work for over 15 years, Rev. W. L. Shambaugh has stopped in this city and will speak this morning at the United Evangelical church. The visitor is a classmate of Rev. G. L. Lovell, pastor of the church, graduating with him from New Berlin college in Pennsylvania. With his wife and small son, Philip, he is a guest at the Lovell home until tonight, when he goes to Portland to deliver a sermon. This is Rev. Shambaugh's second furlough since he has been in China and has been passed principally at his old home at Carlisle, Pa. This coming week he is due to sail again from San Francisco for the Orient.

Although absent from Changsha during the recent revolutions, Rev. Shambaugh has witnessed other exciting events in that city. He was there during the Boxer uprising and was at Li Ling at the time of the big flood, carrying money and food day and night to the suffering populace.

Not long ago his home, then under the flag of the Red Cross, was a haven during a rebellion for people driven from their dwellings by the enemy.
