YOUTHFUL PRIZE WINNERS GO TO SUMMER SCHOOL

School Superintendent J. A. Churchill Names Those Going to Corvallis

GREAT INTEREST SHOWN

This Form of Rewarding Contestants for State Fair Showings Creastes Interest

Superintendent of Public Instruction, J. A. Churchill, is completing sending to the summer school at Corvallis, the boys and girls who won the capital prizes at the Oregon state fair last September.

At the state fair each year, boys and girls contest in about twenty different subjects, such as corn growing, potato growing, vegetable gardening, poultry raising, canning and sewing. Four different prizes are given by the state fair management, but the capital prize in each project is provided for by donations made to Superintendent Churchill by public-spirited men and women of Portland who are particularly interested in this work. These children come from all parts of Oregon. Shortly after their school closes, they are sent to the agricultural college for a two-weeks' short course with all expenses paid. This form of prize serves as a great stimulant to the club work and is a source of inspiration to boys and girls, as the records show that those who have been attending this summer school during the past two years all plan to complete the high school course and to go on to college. The dates for the summer school this year are from June 23 to July 4.
