WILLAMETTE PAGEANT DRAWS LARGE CROWD

aries and half breeds are shown gathered about the Lee home sobbing over the departure of their beloved friend.

Fourteen months later (episode 13) a courier reaches Jason Lee telling of the death of his wife, Anna Lee and infant son. The grief expressed at the reception of this distressing news is pathetic in the extreme.

Miss Mabel Garrett appears as An-

na Pitman Lee and is excellent in her portrayal of the sweet, patient, ever helpful character pictured so vividly in history.

Episode fourteen is a resume of all that has gone before. It also shows Jason Lee on his mission east and his effective work in arousing interest in the Oregon country which brought the immigration in '39, '40, and '42, and eventually was the means of saving this part of the country to America.

Ship Lausanne Arrives. The arrival of the ship Lausanne is another interesting scene in 1839, also the collection for the school for

the eighteen white children who came on it, and which was to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Methodist church.

The story is carried to Wallace Prairie in episode fifteen, where the building was erected. Jason Lee determined to build a large structure for the Indian students using part of the \$42,000 given him by the New England Missionary society and the \$5000 gift from the government. It was named the Indian Manual Training school. The Indians died so rapidly from the plague, however, that he was obliged to discontinue the work.

The building was later purchased by the missionaries for \$4000 which had originally cost the society \$10,000. It was re-named the New Oregon institute.

The provisional scene (episode 16) which Joseph Meek became famous, proved of great interest. Until later day historians gave them credit, the Methodist missionaries have not been recognized as they should be in their part as promoters of the provisional government. It was well brought out in this act.

Senate Chamber in Granary. The first senate chamber was in the mission granary and there were three men on the executive committee to act as governor.

A garden party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Abernathy is one of the prettiest episodes (fifteen) and

reveals the fact that wherever and whenever women are assembled there will be found feminine occupation and conversation.

Rag tacking and quilting occupies the time of these same women in episode seventeen. Mrs. Josiah L. Parrish being hostess. Miss Chloe Clark, the first teacher with her twenty pupils in the new institute is also shown.

Local folk were particularly interested in the laying of the foundation of Salem in episode eighteen. "Miss Chemeketa" (Amelia Babcock) is christened by Rev. Mr. Leslie in symbolic form with water from the Willamette and re-named "Miss Salem." The appearance of flower girls, singers and courtiers make this scene one of the most picturesque.

Oregon Becomes State. The university gave to Salem most of its land, including the site of the capitol. It financed the plotting of the ground and to it Salem is indebted for its wide streets and parks. Episode nineteen consists of five tableaux, featuring Gen. Lane; rejoining over territorial government; first graduate of institute; boys go to war; Oregon admitted to Union as state.

Laying the cornerstone of Waller occupies episode twenty. Between it and episode twenty-one history gives the story of buildings on grounds and all departments down to the present.

In episode twenty-one the boys respond to the call of war, and the girls are represented working at Red Cross and relief work.

Episode twenty-two is the epilogue and is most spectacular. Willamette is on stage with her maids. The stage which originally is darkened gradually becomes light representing the change from the past to the present.

Willamette bids her pages bring all her people back. Music, Drama, History, then her players, her president, her faculty. They gather round the musing singing Willamette songs, and the effectiveness is heightened by the appearance of soldiers who come singing as they march into the court waving flags. Twelve Liberty girls form a tableaux and the complete ensemble join in the grand finale—the singing of "America."

The interludes depict an Indian fair, love dance, scalp dance, and the three solo dances by the young braves in their contest for the little Indian princess. Immigration: a prairie scoundrel, ye old time choir, the orchestra, and Gen. Lane completes the list of these numbers.

All points of the history used in the play, have been, as nearly as possible, verified by those in a

position to know. It was not written according to any one historian, but was compiled from the works of many writers, using only the points which the largest numbers agreed upon.

The pageant will be repeated Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock and again Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

war department within the last week regarding to situation in Northern Mexico contained no information, it was said, that leads army officers to hold the opinion expressed by Governor Hobbs. The border guard at present exceeds 20,000 troops including cavalry, infantry, field artillery, air, squadrons and engineer units, distributed from Yuma, Arizona to south of Laredo. The latter point is headquarters of the Fourth United States cavalry. Behind these is even a larger force at the demobilization camps or enroute.

Street Car Men Form Branch of Association

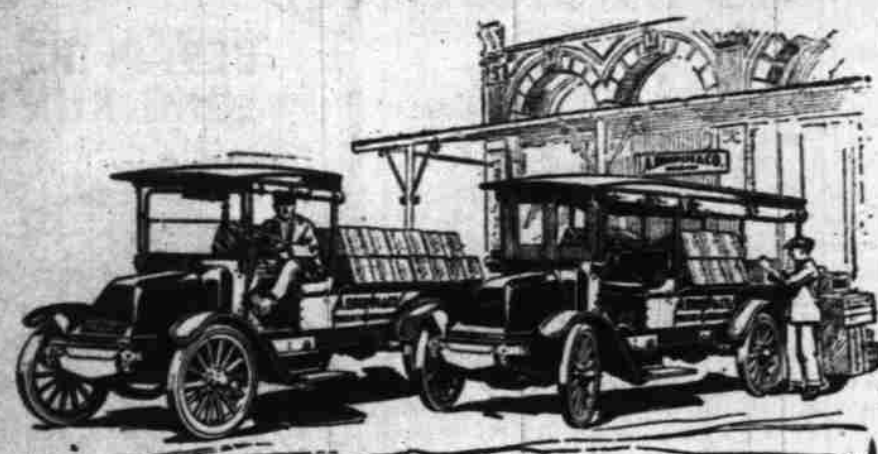

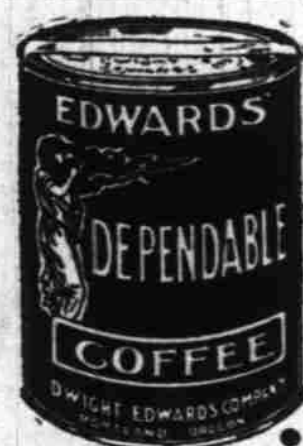
