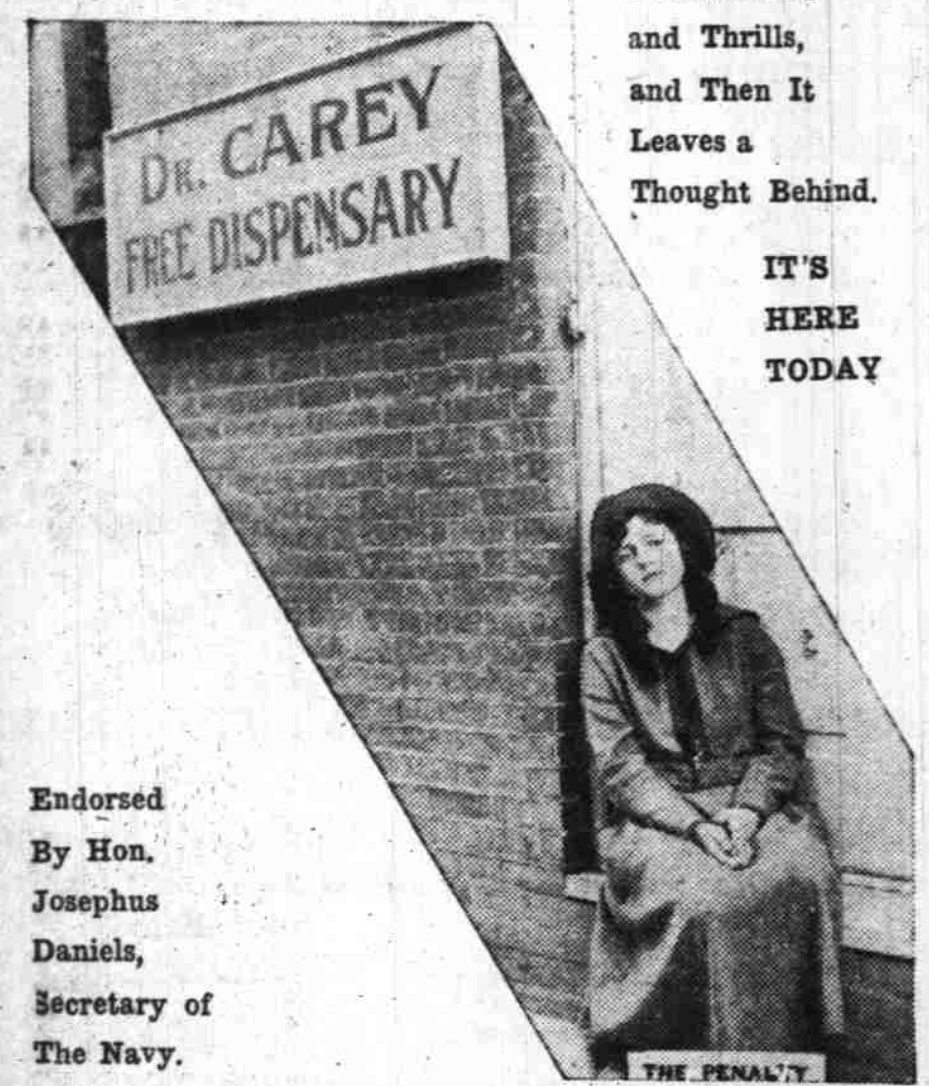

Mexican Conspiracy Introduced Into Henry Ford Libel
Suit—Iron Cross and German Rifles Shown in Court

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., June 9.—Following the trial of Henry Ford's \$1,000,000 libel suit against the Chicago Daily Tribune, now entered upon its fifth week, today got what they have been waiting for, namely the picturesque touch from the Mexican border.

Although all hope for his safety had been given up for nearly a week, Captain Harry G. Hawker has survived his daring attempt to fly from Newfoundland to Ireland. The Australian aviator and his navigator, Commander Mackenzie Grieve, failed to reach their goal with their Sopwith plane but were saved at sea and by taking the supreme sporting chance won the admiration of the whole world. This is the last photograph taken of Captain Hawker in Newfoundland before he started.

Undaunted by the ill luck of Captain Harry G. Hawker and Lieutenant Commander Mackenzie Grieve, Captain John Alcock is preparing in Newfoundland to try to fly across the Atlantic in the race for Lord Northcliffe's \$50,000 prize. He will use as his base the Mount Pearl Plateau airfield, vacated by Hawker, where his Vimy bomber plane will be assembled and put in shape. His intention is to fly light to Harbor Grace, where he will take on a full load of \$65 gallons of gasoline. His plane has a range of 2440 miles. Captain Alcock's companion on the flight will be Lieutenant U. W. Brown.

The story came mainly from Marcus W. Hines, now a customs official at Santa Maria, Texas, and Thomas S. Mayfield, of Pharr, Hidalgo county, Texas, rancher, contractor and land developer.

Other witnesses were Thomas J. Alexander, postmaster and keeper of the general store at Sebastian, Texas; Thomas P. Bishop, former United States marshal at San Antonio and John Harold, an immigration inspector at Brownsville.

Mayfield testified he took a copy of the conspiracy to retake the border states from a Mexican revolutionist whom he captured. He turned the papers over to Bishop, who so testified, and they were in turn given over to Harold for translation. Harold identified the translations on the stand.

The plan contemplated an invasion from Mexico and a simultaneous uprising of Mexican residents in the border states.

Mr. Bishop appeared indignant at the way the case was handled and testified he resigned as marshal "because they would not let me do my duty." On cross examination by Attorney Alfred Lucking, of counsel for Mr. Ford, in connection with the resignation asked:

"The federal authorities regarded it as a trivial occurrence, didn't they?"

"Yes they did," replied the witness with indignation in his voice.

police had not only gone on record as endorsing the sympathetic strike but that the actions of some individual policemen, while on duty had caused doubts as to whether they were doing everything in their power to maintain law and order.

Earlier in the day representatives of the policemen's union announced that the men were willing to sign pledges not to participate in sympathetic strikes in the future. The city was asked, however, to withdraw its ultimatum making such action compulsory.

The police commission immediately announced that all regular policemen who are willing to sign the new pledge could apply for positions. Applications from a number of returned soldiers have been received, it was announced. Returned soldier constables have been on duty for several days as a supplementary force. Mayor Gray organized the constable force after complaints had been received that the regular policemen were discriminating in favor of strikers.

Ship Industry Prospects
on Coast Brighter

PORTLAND, Or., June 9.—Prospects for the Pacific coast steel ship building industry were much brighter today, according to special dispatches received here from Washington, some assurances having been received of more extensive reinstatement of contracts than the \$25,000,000 promised last week.

Representatives of the shipbuilders were more cheerful than they had been for 10 days and said that the situation was working out satisfactorily. It is believed that matters have been completed by the recent successful sales of abandoned types of vessels.
