The May tax was more than \$1000 in excess of the April tax of the same company.

BERRY SUIT SET FOR TOMORROW

Case of Phez Company and Fruit Union to Be Heard in Circuit Court

The suit of the Phez Company against the Salem Fruit Union and about 10 loganberry growers will come up in Department No. 2 of the circuit court, before Judge Geo. G. Bingham, at 1 o'clock tomorrow.

The Phez Company asks for a temporary restraining order, to later upon full hearing be made permanent, against the selling of other parties of the 1200 tons of loganberries under contract to the "Loji" people, which by the merger have come into possession of The Phez Company.

The contract was made in 1917, for five years, at 3 cents a pound. It is understood, however, that The Phez Company is willing to pay a voluntary increase of two and a half cents a pound for this season's crop of the growers involved.

For the growers, it is understood that the Salem Fruit Union will contend that there is no existing contract; that it has been broken.

FIVE CONVICTS ARE DEPORTED

Men Held Undesirable Aliens --Most Are Short Term Bad Check Artists

Out of the penitentiary, into Germany, is what is happening to F. Von Valkental who was released from the prison several days ago and has since been held in the county jail awaiting a federal officer to take him to Ellis Island for deportation to his native land.

He is one of five convicts held as being undesirable aliens, who are being released from the prison to be sent back to their native countries. Most of them are bad check men and their sentences vary from one to seven years.

The others sent east yesterday are Mike Denedyk, Russia; John Peravich, Austria; oe Walbrun, Mexico; Carl Weinzigel, Bavaria.

Missing Youth Is Heard from in Newport Country

Marvin Zehner, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Zehner of Hubbard, who ran away from his home more than a year ago, was heard from this week from the vicinity of Newport where he has been working on a farm. Inquiries from the sheriff's office showed that the boy has left that vicinity and cannot be located.

The parents are almost distracted in their son's long continued disappearance. The boy left home for the purpose of earning sufficient money to put himself through college, according to information received by Sheriff Needham.

Death Calls Mother of D. H. Mosher in Portland

Mrs. Sarah S. Mosher died at the home of her son in Portland, June 10, at the age of 63 years. Mrs. Mosher is an Oregon pioneer of 1852 coming to Oregon when she was two years old, and settling near Oregon City. Later she moved to Salem living here until about two years ago when she went to Portland to make her home with her son.

Mrs. Mosher was in the immigrant train that suffered so much from the mountain fever, in crossing the Blue mountains. Mrs. Mosher's mother, who originally came from Iowa, died of this disease. The following children survive her: D. H. Mosher of Salem, L. Mosher, and W. F. Mosher of Portland, J. Mosher of Crabtree, and M. A. Olive, Neeskuk of Milwaukee.

Rev. H. N. Aldrich will conduct the funeral services which will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 p. m. from the Ricken chapel. Burial will be in the City View cemetery.
