**Marion Needs Postmaster—**  
The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination to be held at Salem, Oregon, on July 12, 1919, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Marion and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$394 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a state where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Application blanks, form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination, can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

Photograph in Her Uncle's Pocket Carries Off Gold Trophy in Novel Contest Worked by Two Y.M.C.A. Workers.



An American baby show in the heart of France! The minds of Americans overseas are fertile enough in ideas for the diversion of the doughboy, but here is something new, devised by two Y.M.C.A. women workers.

The show was held at Fort St. Menge, where the 601st Engineers were stationed and where, too, there is a large candidates' school. It wasn't a show of real live babies, for that, obviously, would be impossible, but it was the next thing to it.

Of course every soldier-daddy carries next his heart the picture of the greatest baby in the world. There are many soldier bachelors, too, who find inspiration and encouragement in the photographs of little brothers or sisters or nephews or nieces. Combined with this is the tendency of the doughboy overseas to tell the American women he meets all his stories of home and to show them his latest snapshots from the U.S.A. Naturally a lot of the boys had unbosomed themselves to Miss Anna Blanton and Miss Mary Paxton, Y.M.C.A. workers, at Fort St. Menge. The show of baby pictures resulted.

Every man in the 601st Engineers and the Candidates' School was invited to prove that his baby was the cutest on earth by entering his or her picture. Immediately there was a rush of candidates, sponsored by both officers and privates.

Betty, a curly haired youngster who counts Private O. Friday as her proud uncle, won the grand sweepstakes prize. Doubtless she is the first American baby to whom a gold medal ever was awarded in France.

The Y.M.C.A. workers who not only suggested but directed the show in all its details are Southern women Miss Blanton was a teacher who left her classes in Nashville, Tenn., to go to France and help keep the doughboys happy, and Miss Paxton formerly had a government position in Roanoke, Va.
