He had been at the following places: Newport, Toledo and Elk City. He told them it was his plan to find a place where he could work for his board and go to school next winter. He spoke of trying to get a place a mile or so from Corvallis. His parents want him to know there is a good chance waiting him right in his home town. Hubbard. PRICE OF CORN
STILL SOARING
Nervousness Over Crop Out-look Leads to Highly Active Trading
CHICAGO, June 13.—Nervousness over the crop outlook led to active trading in corn today and prices touched the topmost level yet this season. Retentions followed, but the market closed strong, half cent to 1 1/2c net higher with July \$1.72 to \$1.78 and September \$1.65 to \$1.68. Oats gained 3/4 to 7/8c. Provisions finished 1/2 to 7/8c up. Notwithstanding weather condi-

ions, were better, mivgivings la regard to the progress of the new crop seemed to have attained greater force. Oats bulged with corn.

Now record breaking high prices were touched by lard. Pork and ribs strengthened too, all stimulated, by jumps in hog vines and grain.

MAKED ADVANCE
SEATTLE, June 13.—Lumber prices are up \$4, to \$5 per 1000 feet according to quotations made by representative fir manufacturers, it was learned today. The advances on all yard stocks was \$3 and on timbers \$5. At this rate the lumber market would be \$8 to \$13 a thousand feet higher than during February and March, and prices would be double those of 1914. It is also pointed out that lumber prices generally show that a 60 per cent advance over the five year average prevailing prior to the war.

WOULD STABILIZE
FLOW OF WHEAT
Premium Covering Storage Charges to Basic Price
NEW YORK, June 13.—To preserve a natural flow of wheat from the farm, periodical premium covering storage charges will be added to the basic price at various guarantee markets, according to an announcement here tonight by Julius H. Barnes, United States wheat director.

These premiums will not be intro-duced by July when prices prevailing for the last year will remain in effect. For each succeeding month, however, premiums will be announced 30 days in advance.

Mr. Barnes also announced rail-road rates from the inter-mountain and Pacific coast territory to Galveston and New York will be reduced to 56 cents per hundred, the equivalent to 33.6 cents per bushel. This reduction, Mr. Barnes explained, is intended as a relief to the producers in those sections as the grain corporation cannot pursue its practice of making effective a \$2 blanket minimum mountain price for all wheat at inter-mountain points, but will be obliged to confine itself to paying \$2 at Pocastello, Great Falls and Salt Lake City, leaving the rest of the western territory to base on the commercial market most readily reached by it.

To assure a larger flow of wheat to the gulf ports, Mr. Barnes said he had decided to seek an executive order increasing the number 1 base price at Galveston and New Orleans from \$2.28 to \$2.30 per bushel. He added he expected this change would become effective July 1.
