TURKS PLACE BLAME FOR WAR ON GERMAN ADMIRAL

PARIS, June 17.—The Young Turks, the former German emperor and Russian greed for Constantinople were responsible for Turkey's entrance into the war, according to the statement of the Grand Visier to the council of ten today when he pleaded for the withdrawal of the

Greeks from Smyrna and the preservation of old Turkey intact, to insure peace among 300,000,000 Mohammedans throughout the world.

The Grand Visier said a German admiral on a German warship actually declared Turkey in a state of war, after a secret agreement with the Committee of Union and Progress for whose action the Turkish people were not responsible.

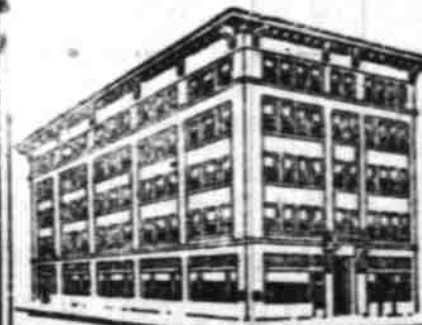
